Give additional background information on your organization's programs as they relate to this application and the qualifications of the personnel who will be in charge of this program. Show that you have the ability to carry out this program.

Our organization has never offered spay/neuter or TNVR services to the public. Until our current Executive Director was hired in August of 2018, our organization only had a part-time veterinarian who could only accommodate the sterilization of our shelter pets. We now have a full time vet who is Humane Alliance trained and we are ready to dive into the dramatically underserved arena of TNVR in our County. We have forged an alliance with Community Cats of Charlotte, a small organization, focusing on feral cats, has been doing TNVR in our community for a long time but on a very small scale. Our Director believes that feral cats are a community problem and we need to be a part of the solution.

If you currently have a program for sterilization of cats and/or dogs, describe your current level of funding and productivity and why additional resources are needed?

We do not have a program available to the public, but our veterinarian sterilizes all of our shelter pets.

There are very few options for TNR in Charlotte County. Community Cats of Charlotte TNR only 480 cats per year, in a county that is home to an estimated 30,000 feral cats. The entire county is in need of additional TNR assistance. Only cats in colonies/areas with known caretakers will be eligible for this program.

For TNR program, describe the ability to maintain lifelong care for remaining cats, commitment level of volunteers/organizations, etc.

Only cats with known caregivers will be eligible for this program. Each cat will be microchipped so if the cat is displaced and picked up by animal control, we will be notified and can return it to it's colony. We have a barn cat adoption program if a cat cannot be returned to its colony. We also have a food bank to help caregivers with feeding their colonies, when needed. Our veterinarian will provide low-cost veterinary assistance on a limited basis if a feral cat is ill or injured.

Describe any effort to lessen the negative impact on local wildlife.

A study conducted by the U.S. Department of Fish and Wildlife concluded that only 1.74% of wildlife fatalities are a result of outdoor cats, well below the percentage of fatalities caused by habitat destruction, automobiles, pesticides and disease. But even with this small percentage, we do recognize the predatory nature of cats. With our TNR program in place, we will be doing something to help control the ever-growing population of feral cats, so wildlife fatalities due to cats will not continu

Describe efforts that will be made to mitigate current or potential nuisance issues.

Sterilization of feral cats will stop most of the behavior that residents find so frustrating. Male cats will no longer spray and are less likely to fight. Female cats will no longer go into heat or have litters of kittens on residents' porches, in their garages or sheds.

While this organization has never had a formal TNVR program before, we will not be reinventing the wheel! We are fortunate in that we have close alliances with many organizations who have started successful TNVR programs who are more than willing to assist and guide us. These organizations include Cat Depot, Gulf Shore Animal League, Community Cats of Charlotte, Feline Friends of Southwest Florida, SPCA Florida, and Operation Catnip.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

If we are awarded these funds, we expect to sterilize 893 feral cats in Charlotte County.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

Currently, Community Cats of Charlotte sterilizes approximately 40 cats per month, which translates to 480 cats a year. With our program, we will increase this number by 893, making the total number of feral cats sterilized in Charlotte County 1,373 over a one year period. This represents an increase of 65%.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Only feral cats in Charlotte County with known caregivers will be eligible for this program.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We will utilize our relationships with feral cat trappers in the area and with Animal Control in our county. All calls to Animal Control regarding feral cats will be diverted to our program coordinator. We will provide door hangers for Animal Control Officers to distribute in neighborhoods heavily populated with feral cats. We will also utilize our website and social media to spread the word that the program exists.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

We do not anticipate transportation being a barrier, as local trappers will be transporting cats in traps to our facility. We do have a new cargo van available to assist if needed. We do not anticipate language barriers to be an issue. the 2010 census showed that 92.3% of Charlotte County residents are English-speaking. We do anticipate a potential barrier being residents who call Animal Control to remove a "nuisance" feral cat(s). According to local ordinances, Animal Control must remove nuisance animals but there is nothing in the ordinances that state that Animal Control must permanently remove the animal. However, a complainant will not appreciate it if the animal re-appears in the neighborhood, minus the tip of an ear. In order to address this barrier, Animal Control and the Animal Welfare League must work together to educate the public about the benefits of TNR and the potential alternative outcomes for these cats. Studies have shown that if given the option between TNVR or Euthanasia, most people will choose TNR.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

Animals will be transported in traps by area trappers and volunteers. These individuals will likely use their own vehicles but we do have a new cargo van to assist if needed. All volunteers who are new to trapping/TNR will be adequately trained and liability waivers will be used.

Veterinary Services

What arrangements have you made with veterinarians to perform the surgeries?

Our Medical Director, Dr. Jill Kirk, who is Humane Alliance trained and has extensive experience in TNVR will be the program's lead vet and will perform the surgeries. Should the volume of shelter animals needing sterilization inhibit her ability to perform the number of TNVR surgeries

needed to fulfill our grant requirements, we have made arrangements for some of the animals to be sterilized by Dr. Lisa Tipton at Animal Rescue Coalition in Sarasota. Our shelter will provide transportation for any animals that are sterilized at ARC

Animal Rescue Coalition	Will provide surgeries, if needed. They are our "Plan B", in the event that our volume of shelter surgeries is too great to accommodate our required number of TNR surgeries on any given week.
Charlotte County Animal Control	Will assist in identifying neighborhoods with high populations of feral cats. Also will assist with educating the community about the benefits of TNR.

Dr. Kirk works at our shelter 5 days a week. One day a week will be designated as a TNVR only day. She works 48 weeks per year, which means she will have to sterilize 19 cats on her TNR days, which is easily achievable. As mentioned earlier, if our need for sterilization of shelter pets is too great to accommodate the 19 feral cats we have committed to per week, we will send cats to Animal Rescue Coalition, who have agreed to be our back-up clinic, working within the confines of our budget.

Vaccines, dewormer, microchipping will be offset by funds provided by Feline Friends of Southwest Florida and other potential grantors. We will also pursue subsidies from vaccine and microchip manufacturers.

Some funding provided by Feline Friends of Southwest Florida, we will solicit subsidies from vaccine and microchip manufacturers, and we will do targeted fundraising among our supporters and through social media fundraising vehicles.

As this is a program that cannot be paid for by clients, we will need to heavily rely on securing grants, corporate sponsors, and donations in order for this program to be sustainable. Since we do have a contract with Charlotte County, we can consider renegotiating our contract to include feral management (currently, our contract excludes ferals and the feral population in our county is largely ignored). If we can show the success of our inaugural year, it is not inappropriate to ask the county for a \$30,000 increase in County funds.
