Since 2007, Be The Solution (BTS) has been progressive and highly-motivated in distributing spay/neuter vouchers throughout our community; creating educational programs for children & adults to promote the importance of saving lives via spay/neuter; and building strong, vital partnerships with our local animal welfare community- City of Tallahassee's Animal Services Center (ASC), City of Tallahassee's Animal Control (TAC), Leon County Animal Control (LCAC), 20 Local Veterinary Clinics including South Georgia Spay/Neuter Clinic (SGSN), Animal Shelter Foundation (ASF), Leon County Humane Society (LCHS), It's Meow or Never (IMON- TNR organization), and neighboring organizations- Wakulla Animal Control (WCAC), Gadsden County Humane Society (GCHS), and Jefferson County Humane Society (JCHS) and Animal Control (JCAC). We believe that building strong collaborations are a win-win situation in saving lives and reducing the number of homeless and abandoned animals euthanized at our local and neighboring shelters. BTS staff to coordinate this grant program are: 1) Gerry Phipps, Founder and Director of BTS with more than fifteen years experience in building and operating a non-profit animal welfare organization and 2) Sonya White, past Executive Director of Jacksonville Humane Society and Leon County Humane Society with more than thirty years experience in animal welfare organizations.

If you currently have a program for sterilization of cats and/or dogs, describe your current level of funding and productivity and why additional resources are needed?

Initially in 2007, BTS provided discounted spay/neuter vouchers to pet owners in Leon County and gradually year-to-year increased distribution of vouchers to residents in Crawfordville, Monticello, Havana and Quincy – towns shown to have a direct impact on the animal intake at the City of Tallahassee's Animal Services Center. BTS vouchers are distributed to individuals at our office in Tallahassee, located in our thrift shop "The Fix", and also at community events throughout the year. Additionally, with our strong local collaborations, BTS provides vouchers to Animal Control Officers at ASC, TAC, LCAC, WCAC, JCAC to distribute in the field when dealing with animal welfare issues. Local animal rescue non-profits also receive BTS vouchers that support their work in TNR, rescue and animal welfare efforts. Partnering groups include IMON, LCHS, GCHS, JCHS, Big Dog Rescue, You Can Make A Difference, Rest Your Paws, ECAH, Feline Advocates of Leon Co. and Smitten With Kittens. By gradually expanding our voucher distribution each year to local animal groups and ACOs, BTS is directly affecting the decrease in animals being relinquished at the local Animal Services Center. BTS has negotiated fixed rates with more than twenty local veterinarian clinics, to reimburse these clinics for the spay/neuter surgeries. Pet owners complete the voucher application at the BTS office or community event. If they can provide "proof of need" i.e.

unemployment, food stamps, disability etc. or a single income of \$25,000 or less or a joint income of \$40,000 or less, then their voucher co-pay is only \$5.00. Otherwise a dog voucher co-pay is \$35.00 and a cat voucher co-pay is \$25.00. The pet owner is responsible for scheduling the appointment with one of BTS' partner veterinarian clinics and the pet must be current on rabies vaccination at the time of surgery. When the sterilization surgery is completed the pet owner pays the co-pay directly to the clinic in addition to paying for pain meds, fluids and any additional expense they've agreed to. The clinic then sends a bill to BTS and we pay the clinic the negotiated rate per animal that is sterilized. Throughout 2021, BTS completed 6,890 spay/neuter surgeries. The monies to pay for these surgeries were raised via proceeds from our successful thrift shop "The Fix" (established 8 years ago) bequests, grants, sponsorships, and individual donations. Additional grant resources for spay/neuter surgeries will allow us to connect with the harder-to-reach population in targeted low-income neighborhoods, complete more surgeries from these areas and further our progress in keeping animals from entering the shelter. The numbers listed above for shelter "dog/cat" "admitted/euthanized" are skewed due to the fact that during the past two "Covid Years" animal intake has been restricted at the Animal Service Center thus preventing a more realistic picture of our animal population on ASC reports. We can however, reflect back on the 2019 (shelter report) where more than 70% of the intake of cats and dogs came into the shelter from this community area. Considering the poverty level in the target neighborhoods along with the impact of Covid, the estimated numbers of pet cats & feral cats listed above are probably much lower than the actual numbers.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area:

We continue to believe that owned pets in the poverty area and free roaming cats are a contributing factor to pet overpopulation in the target community, which has also seen an increase in human population. While our focus is primarily owned pets, we will continue to work with It's Meow or Never (IMON) to assist where we can with community cats. Because of the past two "Covid Years", we can reflect back on the 2019 (shelter report) where more than 70% of the intake of cats and dogs came into the shelter from this area, which shows there is still work to be done in our community in reaching the "more difficult" neighborhoods, where financial obstacles exist that are preventing spay/neuter of animals. The FAF Community Spay/Neuter Grant program that was established in 2017 has shown successful efforts throughout the past 5 years (alternating between ASF & BTS), and provides factual numbers, and positive results. The partnership includes six active and dedicated community partners –

ASF, ASC, BTS, LCAC, IMON, SGSN. BTS believes that the program will continue to make great strides reducing shelter intake by sterilizing animals located in targeted zip codes.

What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs?

Be The Solution offers low-cost vouchers to residents in these areas. In the fall of 2021 Animal Shelter Foundation opened their new low-cost spay/neuter clinic "Tally Spay", as such, they will not be distributing s/n vouchers in the community but will rather direct pet owners to their clinic for affordable surgeries. In addition to distributing vouchers throughout our community, BTS will continue to provide vouchers to both City and County Animal Control Officers to give to families in-need or those that may otherwise have animals that would be relinquished to the shelter. We believe that by providing free spay/neuter assistance directly to the targeted neighborhoods, it will provide a necessary service that more pet owners will take advantage of thus reducing animal intake at ASC. Additionally the grant program allows the partnering organizations to spend time in the neighborhoods and work closer with animal control in dealing with pet related issues and populations of unaltered animals in the targeted area.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

With the opening of "Tally Spay" ASF's new low-cost s/n clinic, the on-going grant program will transition from a spay/neuter transportation program to a direct animal drop-off program at the selected clinics. The target area for the grant was chosen in order to decrease the number of intakes at Animal Services Center (ASC). Because of the past two "Covid Years" impacting animal intake at ASC, we can reflect back on the 2019 (shelter report) where more than 70% of the intakes for cats and dogs came into the shelter from this area. By targeting spay/neuter efforts in these zip codes we hope to continue to reduce ASC intakes from that area by more than 375 animals.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

With funding of this grant program and the continued initiatives that the collaborative partners are putting forth for this targeted area, BTS' goal is to provide an additional 375 spay/neuter surgeries. BTS will also focus more voucher distribution in the targeted area - in order to reach more animals that would otherwise not be sterilized.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

One of two criteria will have to be met: (1) Eligibility will be geographic, where residents must live in Leon County, south of I-10 and west of Monroe Street or (2) Identified by Animal Control in an area where a free spay/neuter voucher will make it possible for the surgery to occur.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

Materials will include yard signs, posters, flyers, postings on website and facebook, radio/tv interviews, and promotions via ASC and LCHS to reach the broadest portion of the targeted areas letting them know the program is occurring. People will come into the BTS office or other designated distribution site to obtain a grant voucher and then will call the assigned vet clinic to schedule the surgery. The voucher will pay for the surgery, rabies, microchip, and pain meds. Throughout the past five years the necessary grant forms, files, spreadsheets and materials have been established to fully track and efficiently coordinate these surgeries and reimbursement to the vet clinics. Additionally, the six program partners hold grass-roots events at local community centers in the targeted area to provide additional information and share resources available to pet owners i.e. monthly rabies vaccination clinics at ASC, medical care & low-cost vaccinations, pet food banks, TNR initiatives etc.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Providing free spay/neuter of the animals, along with rabies vaccinations & microchips have been major key-elements for its success. The two main spay/neuter clinics partnering in the program are both located in the targeted zip code areas, making it very convenient for the pet owners. We also plan to use the South Ga Spay/Neuter transport if the service is needed to help accomplish completion of the grant. Additionally, we'll continue to work towards building community trust and addressing some of the illiteracy and cultural hurdles through the events held at the community centers and through Animal Control efforts.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

With the opening of "Tally Spay" the county's new focused spay/neuter clinic, the on-going grant program will transition from a transportation program to a direct animal drop-off program at the selected clinic. We also plan to use the South Ga Spay/Neuter transport if the service is needed to help accomplish completion of the grant. Their vehicle is a state-of-the-art van, equipped for transport of animals, and has been used in this program for the past 5 years.

Veterinary Services

What arrangements have you made with veterinarians to perform the surgeries?

The majority of the spay/neuter surgeries will be done at Tally Spay, Animal Aid or the South Georgia Spay/Neuter Clinic. Additional program surgeries (if needed) will be done with local veterinary clinics that are established partners with BTS .

Compliance for the BTS voucher program is established by existing forms, spreadsheets & reports. We review these materials throughout the month and have immediate access to information as needed.

For your voucher program, how have you determined the capacity of the veterinarians listed above to handle the projected capacity?

It is estimated that 40 vouchers will be distributed each month of the grant program to accomplish spay/neuter surgeries. The majority of the program surgeries will be done by Tally Spay, Animal Aid, or South Georgia Spay/Neuter Clinic. Any additional program surgeries (if needed) will be done by the other BTS partner veterinary clinics.

Will you have the ability to report the number of vouchers issued and the percentage that result in S/N surgeries?

Yes – BTS has an existing database that tracks our spay/neuter voucher program including voucher #, dates, clinic used, dog/cat, male/female, co-pays, voucher paid. We will add an additional page to track the grant program vouchers for accurate results and redemption rates.
