Clay County Animal Services is responsible for animal welfare in Clay County. The shelter engages in a multitude of services for the community, including animal intake, lost and found, disaster services, enforcement of ordinances, and cruelty investigations. The shelter also provides low-cost rabies vaccines and microchipping of owned pets. Currently, the shelter does not provide spay or neuter services for owned pets. If CCAS is awarded funding by the Florida Animal Friend organization, CCAS will have the funds necessary to enact a tiered low-cost spay and neuter program and to include no-cost services for those who qualify. This program will be overseen by both the Shelter Manager, Aymie Hellard, and the Shelter Medical Director, Dr. Jennifer Broadhurst. Under their guidance, staff will perform at least eight to ten low- or no-cost surgeries per week resulting in at least an additional 420 surgeries during the program year. Clay County's Community Services Division, led by Community Services Manager, Victoria Hapner, will provide vetting and vouchers for individuals seeking low- and no-cost services using U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines for family size and income on a tiered scale. Community Services already provides vetting and screening for a host of County services. Personnel will be able to screen for low-cost and no-cost spay and neuter services need as they intake Clay County residents for prospective services. Field services personnel from Animal Services will also refer individuals and families for vetting and services as a routine part of their enforcement work in the community. Upon completion of vetting, residents will be provided with a voucher for a no-cost or a tiered low-cost spay/neuter at CCAS and will contact Animal Services to schedule their appointment.

If you currently have a program for sterilization of cats and/or dogs, describe your current level of funding and productivity and why additional resources are needed?

CCAS currently does not fund a low-cost/no-cost spay and neuter program. The County only spays/neuters shelter intakes and returned animals. CCAS did engage in a Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate, Release (TNVR) program until COVID-19 staffing issues made continuing the program impossible. Funding exists to restart the TNVR program Spring, 2022. While CCAS did not expend all of its

funds the previous fiscal year, the unspent funds were personnel funds for positions that were not filled because of the labor shortage resulting from the COVID-19 global health crisis. The County has since raised wages in anticipation of the \$15 minimum wage law that is currently being phased in, and the funds remain available to fill vacant positions to maintain Animal Services at full staffing levels with increased wage and benefit costs. Shortly after the beginning of this fiscal year, in October, 2021, CCAS was involved in a puppy mill and animal hoarding case. The shelter was inundated with the care and placement of over 280 animals, including over 100 dogs. The total cost expended in the seizure and care of these animals was over \$140,000. Given the extraordinary expense incurred at the beginning of the shelter’s fiscal year, funding a low-cost/no-cost spay and neuter program would not be fiscally feasible this year without the support of grant funding. While unable to provide these services, the number of unwanted pets in Clay County continues to grow. Being able to tackle the problem from multiple angles via the revived TNVR program and a low-cost/no-cost spay and neuter program would help CCAS to make a significant dent in the number of unwanted pets and the resulting shelter intakes. The TNVR program will address the problem of community cats within the County, and if funded, the spay/neuter program would address both unwanted cats and dogs within the community via its goal of performing 420 surgeries on owned pets, with dogs being a priority area, in the program year. Most of the dogs in Clay County Animal Services’ shelter are mixes of Pit Bulls or other large breeds. By engaging affordable spay and neuter services for the most financially vulnerable pet owners in the County, CCAS can make a significant impact specifically on the number of large breed dogs brought into the shelter. The shelter anticipates that 30 percent of surgeries will be performed on cats and 70 percent on dogs. Personnel also anticipate that most of the residents seeking services will fall within the lowest-income bracket and will require no-cost services.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area:

The largest contributing factor causing dog and cat overpopulation in Clay County is lack of access to affordable spay and neuter programs. CCAS currently does not provide a low-cost or no-cost spay and neuter program. Selection for a Florida Animal Friend Grant would allow CCAS to provide no-cost or low-cost services to individuals and families who financially qualify. Additionally, a tiered system would be implemented creating a scale of affordability for low- to moderate-income individuals and families and ensuring that affordable spay/neuter services are attainable.

What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs?

Currently, Clay Humane provides low-cost and/or no-cost spay and neuter programs while CCAS is unable to do so. The current institutional capacity of these organizations via all programs and services combined is insufficient to meet the needs of the community. Despite their efforts, over 4,000 animals were admitted to animal control shelters in Clay County last year, including over 1,000 dogs and almost 3,000 cats.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

CCAS hopes to increase the number of spay/neuter surgeries performed by at least 420 in the year following an award, if received. Through increased spay and neuter, CCAS hopes to reduce the unwanted pet population in Clay County and decrease shelter intakes by at least 200 animals from the previous year. Via a low-cost/no-cost spay and neuter program, CCAS hopes to help low- and

moderate-income individuals and families to choose the health benefits of spay and neuter for their pets without concern about affordability. Veterinary costs lead to increased pet surrenders to Animal Services. The ability to add spay and neuter services for pet owners to the current low-cost rabies and microchip offerings will help more owners to keep their pets and reduce the number of accidental litters in the County.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

In the last fiscal year, CCAS sterilized 2,059 cats and 603 dogs. These 2,662 animals were sterilized in the absence of an owned-pet spay and neuter program at the shelter. Adding an additional 420 sterilizations through this program, along with the renewal of the TVNR program, would allow CCAS to sterilize well over 3,000 animals in the coming year, making a significant dent in the unwanted pet population in Clay County.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Community Services staff will screen applicants using U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines to determine eligibility for the program. Based on household size and income level, applicants will be assigned to an eligibility tier and provided a voucher stating their tier-based cost ranging from \$0 to \$75. Households up to 50 percent of Median Household Income would receive surgery services at no cost. Households from 50 percent to 80 percent of Median Household Income would receive services at a cost of \$25. Households at 80 percent to 100 percent of Median Household Income would receive services at a cost of %50. Households over 100 percent of Median Household Income would be asked to pay \$75 for services. Households with more than one animal will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis to ensure that services remain affordable for all animals to receive surgery. Upon receipt of their voucher, they would schedule an appointment with CCAS to have the surgery performed.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

A multitude of advertising methods will be used to promote the program. The County’s Online Presence Team will advertise on social media. Additionally, the County’s Public Information Officer will send out a press release to build awareness. Field officers will share information about the program during their routine work within the community. CCAS will ask partners, such as Clay Humane, to share information about the program. CCAS also participates in community events, including adoption events, where they can share information with community members about the program. Additionally, Clay County’s Community Services Division will provide information about the program to individuals and families who they screen for other services.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

The most significant barrier to full use of the program in Clay County will be lack of awareness, since this will be a new program. CCAS will engage in an educational campaign via both informational brochures and social media regarding the benefits of spay and neuter. CCAS will also engage in a multifaceted campaign to promote the new program to qualified individuals and families via word-of-mouth through Clay County agencies, partner agencies, and social media.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

No, individuals will transport their own pets for participation in this program since the focus is on owned pets.

Veterinary Services

What arrangements have you made with veterinarians to perform the surgeries?

CCAS veterinary staff will perform the additional services. They indicate that their additional capacity, if awarded this funding, will be 8-10 surgeries per week of owned pets from low-income residences.

Future Funding to Sustain Public Spay/Neuter

***Explain how the organization plans to fund this program in the future. Having sustainable plans including other grants, local donations and other services generating revenue enhances the chances of receiving this grant.**

CCAS faced an extraordinary expense this year because of the animal hoarding/puppy mill incident in which over 280 animals were seized. Additionally, the shelter has seen an increase in the number of intakes, particularly of large breed dogs. A successful spay/neuter program will reduce the number of intakes. The reduction in intakes will reduce the cost of operation for the shelter

overall, and the funds saved by caring for fewer unwanted animals will support the ongoing cost of the program. Additionally, the County is developing guidelines for donations. In the future, animal lovers throughout the County will be able to donate the cost of a spay/neuter for a low-income resident to ensure that funds remain available to support this program.
