We have 6 trappers with 134 years combined trapping/tnr experience who will lead the program, 2 per zip code. We have trained 8 other volunteers to successfully trap and are recruiting others to attend the attend the TNR workshops conducted by Fortunate Ferals and hosted by Gulfcoast Humane Society.

If you currently have a program for sterilization of cats and/or dogs, describe your current level of funding and productivity and why additional resources are needed?

We have primarily responded to calls from the community for help, by adopting the cats and kittens who are socialized and the for the others that are returned. Funds come from our Cheryls Ferals funds and donations to the HEAL general fund. There are more cats and kittens than is possible to adopt, the only way to make a difference in cat population is TNR

Please explain if you believe your target area animal population is significantly different than above. Our targeted areas are the lower income areas, low income housing communities, mobile home parks and other areas with fixed income populations who cannot afford the low cost spay neuter services, don't have the access to transport the cats to the clinics or the elderly or inform who may feed but are physically unable to conduct a thr campaign. The above numbers are low, in our experience.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area: People allowing unsterilzed pets to free roam, abandoned animals and unsterilzed community cats reproducing at a rapid rate. The lack of county sponsored easily accessible spay and neuter programs is an ongoing issue.

What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs?

LCAS free spay/neuter TNR program offers an extremely limited number of appointments for the free tnr, and the scheduling process is very rigid, which is difficult when dealing with free roaming cats. Additionally the county shelter has 1 location to serve a population base of 700000+ and is difficult to access for many, particularly for those without a car.

Florida Animal Friend is highly supportive of proposals that are focused on animal populations that are identified as substantial sources of dog or cat overpopulation rather than being diluted over too broad of a geographic area or diverse animal populations. These are the ares from which we receive the most requests for assistance. The requests come from concerned residents, from our volunteers, and from colony caretakers who need assistance with trapping,thr and other vet services.

Describe whether the targeted area is rural, suburban, or urban. Is it commercial, residential, agricultural, or a designated special land use?

33901 and 33907 are urban areas, mostly residential but some commercial abutting the residential areas. 33907 is mostly suburban, residential area with high rental proportions and population churn.

For TNR program, describe the ability to maintain lifelong care for remaining cats, commitment level of volunteers/organizations, etc.

Many of these areas have colony care takers or feeders in place to feed, maintain and help continue to TNR new colony arrivals. We will recruit feeders for currently non maintained colonies. HEAL will supply donated food when available and vet services as necessary. We currently have volunteers who oversee certain areas and maintain contacts and education with colony caretakers in that area, and we will continue that practice in these targeted areas.

Lee County Animal Services, Gulf Coast Humane Society, Cape Coral Humane Society, PAWS, Daniels Parkway Vet, Colonial vet services, and other local vets and rescue groups support TNR programs. HEAL regularly adopts cats and kittens that are socialized, from feral and community colonies.

Describe any effort to lessen the negative impact on local wildlife.

Arranging for regular, sufficient feeding of the colonies should reduce the need to hunt for food. None of the colonies are located in preserves, parks or protected wildlife areas.

Describe efforts that will be made to mitigate current or potential nuisance issues.

we educate and talk with community members and caretakers to reduce any nuisance issues. Often adaptations in routines, feeding locations and times are effective in generating community support. Also the positive results the community sees after a TNR campaign often turn them into TNR advocates for other areas.

We will work with residents and colony caretakers to identify the targeted cats and colonies, establish a feeding routine and coordinate trapping and appointment times, and also for recuperation of cats after surgery. Trapping and recuperation will be conducted by trained volunteers.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

We plan to TNR an additional 500 cats in the targeted areas, and find homes for the adoptable cats and kittens. This will reduce the overall feline population of the areas, future nuisance cat issues, and suffering of unwanted, uncared for free roaming cats and kittens.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

This would increase our overall sterilization rate by 50% and triple the amount of TNR surgeries HEAL Did last year.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

All free roaming, feral or community cats are eligible. Caretakers must be in place to provide food and ongoing TNR for additional cats that appear. HEAL will work with caretakers to provide any vet services as necessary.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

The program will be featured in our newsletter, which is received by our current colony care takers, via email or print, on our website, our social media sites, and by materials at our adoption partner stores, and press releases to local media. Also, we will print flyers in English and Spanish for distribution in the target neighborhoods. Also on Nextdoor for the targeted areas.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

We have volunteers to handle the transportation of the cats to and from the clinics. Illiteracy is not a large issue but we do have many multi cultural volunteers who are fluent in several languages to help bridge any cultural gaps.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

We will not require other transportation assistance, other than colony caretakers and trained volunteers. Everyone is trained thoroughly regarding handling and transporting and will sign the normal waivers that we currently require.

Gulf Coast Humane Society will be the main TNR clinic utilized, with Lee County Animal Services utilized when possible.

We also conduct on going fundraising through planned giving outreach, Facebook, and other avenues and starting a newsletter as a fundraising vehicle as well.
