More than 30 years ago, Clay Humane transitioned from a no-kill shelter to a low-cost full service clinic. Since, we have sterilized greater than 125,000 animals, including more than 32,000 for free. We have five full time veterinarians who provide unrivaled skill in helping us to carry out our mission.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Clay Humane is the area's oldest and most recognized low-cost program. With more than 30 years of experience in providing affordable/ free spay/neuter services, we are prepared to continue - and to GROW - our program. In the last year, through a collaborative effort with our county's shelter, we performed 1,816 TNVR surgeries at no cost to the community. Additionally, we sterilized 1,886 owned cats and 1,293 dogs.

Despite a county-wide collaborative effort with our county animal shelter last year, there are still populations in need of free spay/neuter options. Our program will focus on continuing these efforts and, ultimately, reaching these populations.

Private veterinary clinics offer sterilization services, but the cost is, largely, out of the budgets of a substantial portion of our area population. Pre-qualification, distance to service site, and limited funding have created obstacles to a fully successful sterilization efforts.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

Since transitioning to a low-cost spay and neuter clinic in 1991, we have remained steadfast in our goal of eliminating the sensless euthanasia of healthy animals in our shelters. Our specific goal with this funding would be to sterilized 1,500 community cats with the help of our county's animal services, colony caregivers and rescue groups.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

Our current spay and neuter program is limited by the amount of funding our wellness clinic, private donations, foundation funding, and fundraising monies can support. Each year, without funding, we sterilize approximately 600 feral cats for free. Funding would allow us to increase the number of free surgeries to greater than 2000 in the coming year.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Keeping with our current cat sterilization program, our only requirement for eligibility will be that they are trapped cats from identified feral colonies in our community.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

Advertising for this program would be done via our website, our social media pages, through print media distributed at local events, and via signage at our facility.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Through cooperative efforts with local shelters, rescue groups, volunteers, colony caregivers and advocates, and local business owners, we are able to better identify and assist those in need. Together, we are able to trap, transport, release, and control the uncontrolled growth of feral populations and, in turn, shelter intake numbers.

The program does not directly involve transportation of animals, but we have formed a reliable relationship with many colony caregivers/ volunteers who assist in trapping/transportation issues as needed.

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Clay Humane operates a low cost, full service veterinary clinic. We currently staff 5 full time veterinarians, 3 part time veterinarian, and a support team of 31. Clay County Animal Services	Clay Humane and CCAS have a decades long history of working together to improve the lives of animals in our community. Due to limited medical resources, we provide CCAS with free/ reduced cost veterinary and emergency care for shelter animals, forensic studies for cruelty investigations, and support staff for disaster/ emergency responses. We also perform the spay/neuters required of CCAS per grant funding/ county budget allocations.

Since 2013, Clay Humane has designated a day each week (Feral Tuesday) dedicated only to spaying and neutering community feral cats. Each Tuesday, we accept the first 40 cats in traps for our TNVR program (this year, cooperatively with our county's program) and will continue this program for the foreseeable future. Funding helps ensure continued and concentrated efforts in our community

We seek donations from vaccine manufacturers each year to help offset costs of our spay/ neuter programs, this year will be no different. Vaccines or testing outside of the requested funding will be done at the caregivers' expense.

Allocated funds generated via our wellness clinic, private donations, "spay it forward contributions, and fundraising events throughout the year currently fund our sterilization program. Our clinic and its spay and neuter efforts are self-sustaining; funding helps increase our reach.
