The Humane Society of Manatee County has operated a Humane Álliance model Spay/Neuter Clinic since April 2009. The Humane Society of Manatee County Veterinary Clinic is home to Manatee County's only high-volume/low-cost spay & neuter clinic. More than 6000 spay/neuter surgeries each year continue to help reduce the number of stray and homeless animals in our community and in shelters. Included in this number are 1500 surgeries performed on feral cats brought in by trappers. Vaccine clinics are held several times each year offering free vaccines to those in our community facing financial hardships. Our Veterinary Clinic is open to the public and offers high-quality medical care for dogs and cats at very reasonable costs. Our cat and dog wellness programs are expanding rapidly and the addition of a second veterinarian to the medical team took place in September 2016. Dental examinations and procedures are crucial to maintaining a healthy pet and our low-cost services make dentals very affordable. The most recent lifesaving equipment added is an x-ray machine made possible by the support of generous donors. The mission of the Humane Society is heavily tied to prevention through spay/neuter. We are committed to promoting low-cost and free spay/neuter surgery and seek grants to offer programs for low-income residents. The Humane Society of Manatee County serves as the lead agency in animal welfare in our community due to our ability to offer much need programs and services because of our expanded state-of-the-art Veterinary Clinic. Our spay/neuter programs are led by our Veterinary and Medical Director, Dr. Lindsey Rollend.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

We have a current program for low-cost sterilization of cats and dogs (puppies and kittens over two months and two pounds) available to the public. We also currently provide spay/neuter services for community cats as well as feral cats brought to our Veterinary clinic in humane traps. In addition, we have received numerous grants over the years to provide services to under-served residents and target breeds that contribute to overpopulation at the County Shelter. Unfortunately, the Manatee County Low-income grant provides limited funding which falls short of meeting the dramatic increase of spay/neuter surgeries in Manatee County. It is, for this reason, this grant is greatly needed. Population growth has driven the need to provide low/no-cost veterinary care. As the population of Manatee County continues to grow at rates (3.3 % - 5.2%) that outpace the growth rate statewide, the number of owned animals in Manatee County continues to increase as well. At the current population of two hundred thousand (200,000) owned cats and dogs in Manatee County it is expected that the number of owned animals in Manatee County would exceed two hundred fifty-thousand (250,000) within five (5) years. In

addition to the organic growth of the number of owned pets, the need for low-to-moderate cost veterinary care also continues to outpace the availability of that care. **Number of animals sterilized in that program in the past year:**

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

We hope to accomplish a reduction in the intake of animals from the targeted area and a coinciding reduction in the euthanasia of animals from the targeted area. In addition, we hope to continue to decrease the intake of cats in our area to local shelters and Animal Control. Many counties struggle with the insurmountable number of the cat's surrenders to their local Animal Control agencies, thus resulting in an unacceptable number of euthanasia. Our county continues to be committed to the TNR program, thus subsequently controlling the intake of cats to the shelter. While many counties experience a 3-1 ratio of cats over dog surrenders, our county continually experiences a live outcome of 93% of their cat population. We believe it is mainly related to the active TNR program supported by our local community. Our Community Outreach program has the tools and resources to effectively reach and motivate the targeted community residents to act on behalf of their animal's welfare, but will not have enough funding for the required procedures. Our objective is to decrease in-take from the targeted area by 5%. We have received grants to assist in covering the cost of spay/neuter surgeries, however, we will need to augment that funding to meet the anticipated demand. We are seeking funding to perform an additional 400 surgeries when our low-income funding traditionally runs out.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

The need in this community outpaces the available funding. We do not anticipate any difficulties being able to perform the additional surgeries because we have the capacity in our Veterinary clinic with the assistance of trained veterinarians and technicians.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

For owned cats, we will use the same criteria we use for the funding provided by the Manatee Low-Income grant so it is easy for our staff and the residents, being any form of government assistance or if their income is at or below the standard for poverty. They will need to have some form of ID to show that they live in the targeted area. Community Cats and Trapped cats are brought to our Veterinary Clinic in humane traps and all receive an ear tip.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We will use local print media; social media; Radio and community outreach to advertise the need and will provide all messaging in English and in Spanish to overcome language barriers residing in Manatee County.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

We will address the language and literacy barrier by maintaining the number of staff who are bilingual.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

Rescue groups and Manatee County Animal Services transport TNR cats to the Humane Society of Manatee County from the community.

Our staff Veterinarian manages a team of Veterinarians contracted by the Humane Society of Manatee County. The Humane Society of Manatee County will act as the lead Veterinarian practice. Our team is prepared to meet additional demands when necessary.

Due to the population growth in Manatee County coupled with a very strained unstable economy, this program request will add needed funding to our multi-faceted approach to help stem the influx of animals entering the County Shelter from the targeted area by addressing the increasing needs of the people most likely to turn in their pets or have them picked up by Animal Services. The ability to provide increased funding for spay/neuter services to low-income, under-served neighborhoods with a household income under \$35,000 is critical. The demand for our services has grown exponentially across the entire county. All of the neighborhoods in Manatee County we wish to serve are part of a strategic community effort to help people, help their pets and keep them for the life of the pet. Thank you for collecting funds for this important purpose and for the opportunity to apply.

We will encourage Heartworm testing and low-cost Heartworm prevention. We will also provide ear-tipping and antibiotics for trapped cats and community cats. We continue to seek funding to cover the cost of vaccines for low-income families.

Describe any other funding sources for this program, i.e. other grants, targeted fundraising efforts, budget allocation, etc.

We recently received funding from Manatee Community Foundation to assist with spay/neuter services for families financially challenged. We also created a Spay it Forward fund in which we ask clinic clients and guests to consider participating (with this program last fiscal year we raised over \$10,000). We are also requesting funding to cover low-income residents in need of services from our current donor base and we are and will continue to seek funding to keep up with the demand for services in our community.

In 2021, our organization partnered with a prominent strategy-building company to develop and publish a business plan mapping a path to expand veterinary services at our clinic to meet the needs of the community. Lastly, our organization creates and executes a very detailed Development plan which maps out a variety of goals, strategies, and tactics necessary to raise income to support our programs throughout our organization.
