Nassau Humane Society (NHS) intakes animals from multiple sources, then verifies they are properly prepared for adoption by ensuring every animal is spayed/neutered, microchipped, up to date on all necessary vaccinations and prevention, and any other medical needs an animal may have. We intake animals from our community through our Animal Control program, contracted through the City of Fernandina Beach. In addition to these intakes, when we have the resources and capacity, we will also take owner surrenders from outside of our Fernandina Beach jurisdiction. These animals could come to NHS as strays, owner surrenders, law enforcement seizures, or neglect/abuse cases. We also work to alleviate pressure from kill-shelters in Florida and Georgia by taking transports of animals who are slotted for euthanasia. Our primary focus is to rescue and adopt as many animals as possible, but we also provide services such as a community food bank, lost and found, Animal Control enforcement, and TNR if a cat comes to us via Animal Control that is considered feral and not adoptable. Currently, our shelter does not provide spay/neuter or any sort of medical services for owned animals. If awarded funding from FAF, NHS will be in a position where we can offer TNR and free spay/neuter services to those in our community who cannot afford these services elsewhere. We would be able to carry out these services by two different means: First, NHS has a relationship with a low-cost spay/neuter clinic in Duval County called First Coast No More Homeless Pets. We are automatically allotted 20 spay/neuter slots per week, so any leftover spaces we have can be utilized to send TNR cases. Second, we have a relationship with a local Veterinarian, Dr. Carlos Aguiar, who has a mobile spay/neuter and wellness clinic. Not only does this give us the ability to perform exams and surgeries on site, but it also allows us the ability to go out into parts of our community that are gravely underserved and have no option for affordable services for their pets

NHS has a very basic TNR program, funded by our contract with the City of Fernandina Beach. The City Limits of Fernandina Beach, where we have Animal Control jurisdiction, comprises of less than 15 square miles. Also within the City Limits is an organization with a strong TNR program called Cats Angels. What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

Our goal is to spay and neuter at least 300 cats in our county. As shelters across the nation are experiencing a capacity crisis, doing everything possible to keep animals out of shelters is critical. Historically, people have been taught if you find an animal, to immediately bring them to the shelter. This is simply not realistic, given that adoptions are significantly down, and owner surrenders and stray intakes are at an all-time high, so educating the public about TNR and why it's ok for cats to free roam in our community is

more important than ever. Our aim is to significantly cut down on the outdoor cat population by preventing unwanted litters to aid in this effort.? Nassau County is currently a no-kill shelter community, and we want to keep it that way. Additionally, getting ahead of the problem now is crucial as our county population is growing significantly, and is projected to continue to do so over the next several years.??

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

Last year, we performed only 13 TNR surgeries. If awarded the funds to support our TNR program, we will have the ability to spay and neuter at the very least, 300 cats. The same pricing would be offered to community members who have unaltered animals and no access to affordable spay/neuter services.??

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Eligibility criteria for our proposed program will be very straightforward. Healthy community cats eligible for TNR will be altered on a first come, first served basis in our target communities (Hilliard, Callahan, Bryceville, Yulee, and the areas of Fernandina Beach that are outside of our current jurisdiction: the City Limits). These are rural communities that are known to have several cat colonies, as well as residents that do not have access to affordable veterinary care, including spay/neuter surgeries. These communities are heavily comprised of individuals who make less than \$30,000 a year. When a single spay or neuter surgery can cost well over \$500, these fees are not achievable for most residents in these communities. Spay/neuter services will also be offered to owned pets on a first come, first served basis.??

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We will advertise across a broad spectrum of platforms, including our social media pages, on specific Facebook groups in our target communities, our website, local newspapers, community events, and volunteers will take and post flyers in our target communities where those who are likely to have pets or feed cat colonies frequent.??

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

NHS will make many efforts to break barriers typically associated with getting feral cats or owned cats in rural areas spayed and neutered. First, we will transport our contracted veterinarians' mobile spay/neuter clinic to our target communities. If needed, we have a second vehicle to transport TNRs or owned animals to our mobile unit or First Coast No More Homeless Pets. We can also provide cat traps and our community food bank. We will have staff available to aid clients in filling out paperwork, if necessary, which we will ensure is basic and straightforward. We also have a Spanish speaking employee who can help with language barriers.??

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

The goal is to have little to no need for pet transportation. Having the ability to drive to our target communities with Dr. Carlos Aguiar's Heal Mobile allows NHS to perform spay/neuter surgeries in the communities that need it the most. For the animals that we transport to First Coast No More Homeless Pets for surgery, we have our own vehicle and staff to carry out the task. Clients will be given a liability release form to sign and the staff transporting animals are trained and insured to transport animals. Our staff are also trained in handling animals pre- and post-surgery in the safest ways possible. NHS has a separate space in our medical department to temporarily house animals comfortably until they are transported back to their owners.??

It is well known in our community that there are numerous cat colonies and the need for TNR all over, especially in the more rural areas of our county. This is something that both Nassau County Animal Services, our counties municipal animal welfare organization, and Cats Angels, a local organization that focuses heavily on TNR and community cat education, can attest to. If granted funds for our proposed program, we will be able to travel to communities with the most need (Callahan, Hilliard, Bryceville, Yulee, Fernandina Beach outside of the City Limits) due to lack of affordable care, education, and transportation, to address their spay/neuter needs. We already have a mobile spay/neuter vehicle reserved and staffed to carry out our program. If we need to utilize First Coast No More Homeless Pets for spay/neuter needs, we have trained staff who carry out animal transport to this facility weekly, who will be able to safely facilitate transporting TNR cases to and from the facility.??

Microchipping would come at an extra expense which would be the owners responsibility. Rabies vaccinations will be offered at NHS's expense.

NHS will continue to conduct fundraising efforts to cover medical expenses for the animals in our care and animals in our community who need it the most. We also have a very successful thrift store that is continually expanding. Profits from our stores directly support NHS.?

NHS holds an annual fundraiser called Pasta 4 Paws that draws a huge crowd. Our event gains more traction and brings in more funds every year. In addition to this, we are working on creating a second annual fundraiser, and we have our very successful thrift stores, Second Chance and The Closet, that have expanded operations due to its continual success. These stores bring in a hefty amount of revenue every month that directly supports NHS. NHS puts our two appeals annually requesting financial support from our community and we are continually holding smaller scale fundraisers to support specific projects and general operations.??
