Give additional background information on your organization's programs as they relate to this application and the qualifications of the personnel who will be in charge of this program. Show that you have the capacity to carry out this program.

Pasco County Animal Service (PCAS) has had longstanding spay/neuter programs for the public that support both low-income qualified personal pet sterilizations and Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate, and Return programs. These are funded through license sales, co-pays, and grants. PCAS uses outside veterinary offices and clinics to perform the majority of the program surgeries. PCAS has also partnered with other organizations that provide sterilization services as well as trapping for TNVR programs and grants. PCAS has also performed surgeries for both programs with staff veterinarians and veterinary techs as well.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Two primary programs: 1) Low-income qualified for personal pets (dogs & cats). A \$20 co-pay is required for dogs surgeries and \$10 co-pay for cats. PCAS then pays the local veterinary parterning clinic for the contracted cost of the surgery. 2) Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate, and Return (TNVR) program is for feral and community cats. Citizens trap the cats and take them to a participating veterinary clinic for sterilization. There is a \$5 co-pay for this program. PCAS pays the participating veterinary clinic the contracted amount for each cat. PCAS has also been holding pop-up clinic once a month to bring in contracted veterinarians and teams to sterilize up to 100 feral or community cats for each event.

What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs? There is only one low-cost, non-profit clinic on the westside of Pasco County, yet it is one of the most heavily populated areas. Many of the vet clinics that used to participate in the S/N programs have ceased as new corporate owners are profit driven and seem to care less about community support.
Florida Animal Friend is highly supportive of proposals that are focused on animal populations that are identified as substantial sources of dog or cat
overpopulation rather than being diluted over too broad of a geographic area or diverse animal populations. Describe the specific target animal population(s) of the spay/neuter project proposed for this grant:

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

The goal is to complete approximately 1,000 feral and community cat sterilizations in the west Pasco communities.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

Pasco County Animal Services funds approximately 2,800 cat TNVR sterilizations per year through the Spay Neuter in Pasco program. The additional pop-up clinics offered through the grant will increase that number by 1,000 to assist the communities on the west side of Pasco County.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

The grant funded pop-up clinics for TNVR surgeries will be focused on cases identified by Animal Control and citizen requests involving feral and community cats in various neighborhoods on the west side. TNVR trappers and TNVR rescue organizations will help identify and transport for these clinics.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

The nature of these pop-up clinics will require little up front advertisement to solicit cats. However, the grant funding from FAF will be recongized at the Board of County Commissioner meetings, through our social media, at our shelter, through our website, and through press releases.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

These barrier have been removed during previous pop-up clinics. We have spanish speaking animal control officers and rescue partners that assist our hispanic population with information and trapping. Transport is being accommodated for the public to get the TNVR cats to the pop-up clinics.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

Transportation is being provided by Pasco County Volunteer drivers utilizing our MEOW mobile. TNVR trappers and TNVR rescue partners will also be used to for cat transport. All are trained, qualified, and have previous experience with transporting cats for the pop-up clinics.

The pop-up clinics are a partnership with PAWS Vet Care Center, Slomba Shelter Solutions, Inc., and Pasco County Animal Services. PAWS provides the facility and equipment, Slomba Shelter Solutions contracts with area veterinarians and vet techs, and PCAS provides oversignt, transportation, and funding.

Pasco County Animal Services has previously partnered with Humane Society of Tampa Bay, Slomba Solutions, Cat Haven Rescue, The Runaways Animal Rescue, Rescue Pets of FLorida, and Tip My Ear Rescue to conduct successful Pop-Up TNVR Clinics during the past year. These clinics became increasingly important to help manage cat overpopulation as many of our local vet clinics who assisted with TNVR were bought out by corporated veterinary clinics and no longer offered our programs for public TNVR.

Pasco County Animal Services will pay 1/2 of all TNVR surgeries which will include costs for FVRCP and any parasite meds needed for TNVR cats.

Pasco County Animal Services will use a portion of it Spay Neuter in Pasco (SNIP) funds to support the efforts of the grant funded Pop-up TNVR Clinic progect.

Future Funding to Sustain Public Spay/Neuter

Pasco County Animal Services has tested the Pop-Up TNVR Clinic concept for approximately 6-months to date. Our partnership with Slomba Solutions, Clinics, & partner organizations for TNVR sterilization support continues to be strong. The Pop-Up TNVR Clinics have become more dependable with greater results for TNVR than the local vet clinics are willing to provide. This model may become a more sustainable option than our current SNIP program offering for TNVR.
