Pet Alliance has operated its Community Cat Initiative since 2017. The program specifically targets the community cat population in Central Florida and works to reduce the numbers through TNVR. Since its launch, Pet Alliance has had one full-time staff person that works on the coordination and management of the program. She is responsible for all aspects of volunteer training, community education/canvassing and coordination of trapping and transportation of animals to and from Pet Alliance's clinic. As part of this program, Pet Alliance has also dedicated every Friday in one of our veterinary clinics to the surgeries for our TNVR program. This has resulted in more than 12,000 surgeries on community cats. Funding from the Florida Animal Friends grant program will allow us to expand this work to a second veterinary clinic and focus on the geographic area in the heart of downtown Orlando.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Pet Alliance currently offers no cost spay/neuter through our TNVR program and low-cost spay/neuter for the public at our veterinary clinics. The TNVR program is coordinated by Pet Alliance staff and trained volunteers. All of the cats that we spay/neuter have been trapped by our staff/volunteers or are brought to us via community partners like CARE TNR. The public spay/neuter surgeries are available to the general public via appointments.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

Pet Alliance began its Community Cat TNVR program in 2018. Since then, the surgeries have all been performed at our Alafaya Clinic located on the eastern side of Orlando. The funds from the Florida Animal Foundation grant will fund the TNVR program at our new Downtown Cat Shelter. This second location will allow us to increase the number of surgeries and also be a more accessible location for the zip codes that this grant is targeting. At the Downtown Cat Shelter, every Wednesday is designated for TNVR surgeries. Over the course of 12-months, Pet Alliance's goal is to TNVR 720 cats at this location.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

This program will increase the number of surgeries by 720, since this is a new location and program for the agency.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

This program will only provide spay/neuter surgery for un-owned community cats. Pet Alliance has designated staff and volunteers that perform the trapping. The cats will be located via canvassing and input from residents and trappers on locations of colonies.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

Pet Alliance already has a working model in place for communicating its TNVR program. If we are entering a new neighborhood, we start with canvassing the homes and businesses in the area to share literature and talk to residents about what we are doing. This allows us to answer questions and get to know the community members before we start trapping activities. This same model will be used in the new location. We also have identified two volunteer trappers that are already working in the zip codes that will be partnering with us to collaborate on trapping.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Pet Alliance has the benefit of having its facility located in the neighborhood that is being targeted with this program. Currently, staff and volunteers are working to build relationships through canvassing, partnering with local social service agencies, talking with neighborhood organizations and working to become a part of the community.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

Animals are transported by staff and volunteers who are all properly trained and using the correct equipment to ensure the safety of the animals and handlers. Since the animals are un-owned community cats, there is little liability in the way of issues with owners. Pet Alliance has an extremely good track record for the safe transportation of animals. Any new volunteer is given thorough training via our "TNVR Bootcamp" training program.

CARE TNR	Pet Alliance has worked for many years with the volunteers of CARE TNR to trap and s/n community cats. We provide them with discounted surgery and they assist with providing volunteer assistance for the education, trapping and transportation of cats.
City of Orlando	The City of Orlando provides funding to assist with Pet Alliance's work to provide TNR services within the city limits. They are also helpful in connecting us with community members and groups that can assist with outreach and education.

Pet Alliance committed to reducing the number of homeless cats in Central Florida when it developed the Community Cat Initiative in 2017. Since then, more than 12,000 cats have been altered as part of the TNVR program. Since it's inception, the same staff person has coordinated the program so it has had continuity and growth over the years. Because of this, we feel confident that we will be able to successfully expand the overall TNVR program into this new area and add a surgery day at our new Downtown Cat Shelter.

The \$35 per surgery cost in this grant only covers a portion of the surgery cost for total number of cats. Additionally, Pet Alliance also vaccinates the cats in the TNVR program. The cost for the additional expenses will be covered via Pet Alliance's general operations fundraising. Pet Alliance also has funding set aside for community cat medical electives. This includes procedures such as wound care, amputation and eye surgery. These procedures can provide a better quality of life for injured community cats. This funding is provided via individuals and grants from foundations that like to fund this work.

Describe any other funding sources for this program, i.e. other grants, targeted fundraising efforts, budget allocation, etc.

Pet Alliance funds its TNVR program through allocation of general operating fundraising income and public clinic service income. Having in-house veterinarians allows us to set aside one-day a week of their time to perform the TNVR surgeries.

Pet Alliance will continue to use general operations funding and seeking out grants to fund this program in the future. Our goal is to have one TNVR day at the Downtown Cat Shelter as long as the location is in operation.
