Our efforts have been sustained by a combination of fundraising endeavors, community donations, and educational initiatives, supported by the commitment of our invaluable trappers and veterinary collaborators. Leading our TNVR program is Deborah Hoch, who brings a wealth of expertise and passion to the role. As the Treasurer of Candy's Cats and a seasoned accountant with a Bachelor's degree in Accounting and a Master's in Business Administration, Deborah's leadership is grounded in a deep understanding of both financial management and animal welfare. With 15 years of involvement in feline rescue, including the management of two cat colonies for a decade, Deborah's hands-on experience underscores her dedication to the cause. Her exemplary management of the 2023 grant funds, which facilitated the sterilization of 222 felines, speaks volumes about her capability and commitment to our mission.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area: Uncontrolled breeding due to unaltered cats roaming freely contributes significantly to overpopulation. Cats are able to reproduce at a very young age (four months old) and have multiple breeding cycles, especially in spring as the days become longer. Without spaying and neutering efforts, their numbers can quickly spiral out of control. Cats that are abandoned or allowed to roam freely can breed with each other and contribute to the stray population. These cats often lack proper care and can reproduce unchecked, exacerbating the overpopulation problem. Many people may not fully understand the importance of spaying and neutering their pets or the consequences of allowing their cats to breed freely. Education and awareness campaigns are crucial in addressing this aspect of the problem. For some communities, especially those with limited resources, access to affordable veterinary care for spaying and neutering may be scarce. This can hinder efforts to control cat overpopulation. Addressing these sources requires a multifaceted approach, including widespread spaying and neutering programs, adoption initiatives, community outreach and education, and support for accessible veterinary services. What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs? Affordability is and has been an issue. Our organization provides TNVR services to the Apopka, Ocoee and Winter Garden Florida areas. Florida Animal Friend is highly supportive of proposals that are focused on animal populations that are identified as substantial sources of dog or cat overpopulation rather than being diluted over too broad of a geographic area or diverse animal populations. Describe the specific target animal population(s) of the spay/neuter project proposed for this grant:

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

We collaborate with independent trappers to deliver TNVR services in targeted areas, aiming to curtail the stray feline population and alleviate unnecessary suffering. Our commitment to these local efforts remains steadfast. In 2023, Candy's Cats received a grant which enabled the sterilization of 222 felines. A significant portion of our funding, sourced from donations and adoption fees, is allocated to the medical and foster care needs of adoptable cats. Grants provide us with the vital resources to partner with trappers in addressing the issue of feral cat populations.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

It's important to note that sterilizing a single female cat can prevent her and her progeny from producing approximately 5,000 kittens over a span of seven years. With additional funding, we can conduct TNVR for approximately 22 cats per \$1,000, effectively averting the birth of around 110,000 stray cats within the same time frame. A donation of ten thousand dollars would enable Candy's Cats to perform TNVR procedures on 220 felines, potentially preventing a staggering 1.1 million preventable kitten births. Our organization has funds set aside for TNVR purposes, however, those funds are only able to cover roughly 40 cats without any grant funds. This amount is much less impactful in terms of overpopulation of cats than we would be able to achieve with grant funding.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

As a TNVR program, we will use the funds to sterilize only free-roaming cats and kittens in the described zip codes.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We maintain close collaboration with seasoned, independent trappers, ensuring effective communication and coordination. Upon availability of funds, we promptly notify these

trappers individually. The prospect of funding often garners enthusiastic participation from trappers who are keen to collaborate with Candy's Cats.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

The independent trappers in our community play a crucial role in facilitating transportation to and from the veterinary offices for the cats. At present, we are fortunate not to encounter any significant obstacles aside from the need for additional funding.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

The independent trappers utilize their privately owned vehicles to transport the cats, ensuring their safety within humane animal traps. These trappers are experienced and seasoned, and Candy's Cats does not currently need to engage in training, nor do we provide liability releases in this process.

We work with multiple veterinary clinics to perform spay and neuter surgeries. We have contacted them to inform them about our application for this grant, and have letters from both veterinary offices stating that they are willing to continue working with us for TNVR services.

With consistent weekly appointments at affordable veterinary clinics, Candy Sullivan facilitates access for trappers to bring in cats for Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) procedures. This strategic collaboration with veterinarians and trappers ensures a streamlined process for spaying and neutering cats and kittens, contributing significantly to our organization's mission of controlling the feline population and promoting responsible pet ownership. A grant would amplify our efforts by providing crucial financial support for these operations, enabling us to expand outreach, increase the number of spay/neuter procedures performed, and ultimately make a greater impact on the welfare of community cats.

Our organization does not expect any additional expenses beyond the \$45 per cat fee, but any excluded expenses incurred will be covered by our donations, fundraisers, and the VMX conference proceeds.

As a well established charity, we have various sources of revenue raised throughout the year, portions of which are earmarked specifically for TNVR purposes. This includes: * Online auctions of donated items and gift baskets * Fundraisers at various restaurants in our area (Percentage of sales are donated to CCI) * Adoption Fees * Direct donations from the community * The Orlando Veterinarian (VMX) conference annually providing kittens for conference guests to interact with.

In our ongoing commitment to extend TNVR services within the local community, we will earmark a portion of our donations and fundraising endeavors specifically for this program. Additionally, we will continue applying for TNVR grants. We firmly believe that these concerted efforts play a pivotal role in sparing thousands of cats and kittens from avoidable suffering.
