Humane Society Naples' has been recognized state-wide and nationally for its leadership role in SW Florida's humane services. In 2023, HSN was awarded a major year-long grant from the Best Friends Animal Society and Florida Leaders in Lifesaving to assist rescue groups in Collier, Glades, Hendry, and Lee Counties to improve their lifesaving efforts - with the goal of helping them to achieve the 'no-kill' status we are so fortunate to maintain. Included in that grant program is assisting with spay/neuter operations that many of these shelters are not equipped to offer. Our capacity to carry out spay/neuter outreach results from our Mobile Veterinary Clinic (MVC), staffed by two veterinarians on our team with full support by qualified veterinary technicians. The MVC is charged with reaching remote areas of Collier County which are essentially "veterinary deserts," the closest veterinary services being 40 or more miles distant. Many of these areas also have a higher than average low-income population. In 2023, 57 community visits were conducted by the MVC. We treated 898 dogs and cats, including 349 spay/neuter surgeries with the MVC. We also provided 1,238 vaccines and 1,847 flea prevention medications via the MVC in 2023. Dr. John Morton is our Chief of Medical Services; Dr. Edna May Seymour is the lead veterinarian for the MVC.

#### Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

We have two programs offering no or low cost spay/neuter services. SNAP (Spay Neuter Assistance Program) offers free or highly discounted spay/neuter surgery including rabies vaccination. In 2023, this program cared for 227 dogs and cats. The second program addressing this need is our community/feral cat program that provide free spay/neuter, microchip, vaccines, and flea/tick prevention to free-roaming cats in Collier County. With this program we sterilized 138 cats in 2023.

## Objectives

### What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

There were 860 dogs admitted to animal control shelter from 34120 in the last FY. The majority of these dogs have not been spayed or neutered. Our goal is to spay/neuter 100 females and 100 male dogs in the grant period.

#### How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

Our program will spay/neuter roughly 25% of the number of dogs that last year entered animal control shelter from 34120.

#### Methods

#### What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Eligibility for our spay/neuter program is determined primarily by residency within the 34120 zip code. Participants will be required to demonstrate proof of residence through a valid address. This targeted approach ensures that our resources are directed towards the community most in need, aligning with our mission to address pet overpopulation in this high-need area.

#### How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We plan to utilize a multi-faceted approach to advertise our spay/neuter program, leveraging both our Mobile Veterinary Clinic and our community outreach team. The MVC, already conducting wellness activities in the area, serves as a moving billboard, promoting our services directly to the community. Additionally, our outreach team will attend local events to further increase program visibility. To extend our reach, we will utilize a Google ads grant and engage our audience via our social media platforms, ensuring wide and effective coverage of our program announcement.

## How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Our program is uniquely positioned to overcome barriers to access through the use of our Mobile Veterinary Clinic, which brings services directly to the community, significantly reducing transportation barriers. For those facing significant transportation issues, our network of volunteers can provide animal transportation services. Our staff, including bilingual members, reflects the diversity of our community, allowing us to communicate effectively and sensitively across cultural and language barriers. By engaging directly with community members and leveraging our strong community partnerships for clinic locations, we address cultural hurdles through education and dialogue, emphasizing the benefits of spay/neuter services.

# Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

While our primary mode of service delivery is through our Mobile Veterinary Clinic, which minimizes the need for animal transportation, we do have provisions for exceptional circumstances where a client cannot access our services. In these rare instances, our trained volunteers may transport animals to and from our Mobile Veterinary Clinic. All transported animals are required to be securely confined in crates to ensure their safety and the safety of our volunteers. Owners are required to sign liability waivers to protect all parties involved. Our volunteers are trained in animal handling to ensure they are well-equipped to manage and minimize stress for the animals during transportation. This comprehensive approach ensures the safety and well-being of both the animals and our handlers throughout the process.

Our MVC clients as well as our SNAP clients pay what they can, but it is usually a minimal amount. We will limit grants funds to only those services approved for expenditure on the grant agreement. Special Note: On our review copy of the proposal, the Microchip is not marked required; it keeps coming up blank or not available. Please know it is always required of all animals we serve.

variety of community groups	We enjoy a level of collaboration with many varied groups in our target area, ranging from the sheriff's department and the county animal control shelter to local rescue groups and individuals and families with active concern for animals in their area. We have strong support from local media and our HSN social worker, who goes out with every visit of the MVC, has strong connections with area social service agencies. Our "grapevine" is strong and if we are funded, there is no question all our colleagues will actively promote getting these essential surgeries for the large dogs so ubiquitous in the target area.

## Other Information

As we noted earlier in this application, much of Collier County is challenged by "veterinary deserts." The County is so large and parts of it are so underserved that access to medical care for pets is virtually impossible. Launched in January of 2021, the Mobile Veterinary Clinic aims to bring free or reduced-cost medical care, services and information to people and pets in communities who are unable to access or afford these services. The MVC program delivers affordable welllness, prevention and basic care as well as surgical

services to areas of the County that otherwise would not have access to any vet care. There are no income qualifications for clients; instead, there is an honor system for payments with the expectation that people financially contribute what they are able to towards their pet's visit. (There is a \$10 minimum contribution per pet). Services include: Basic Wellness Exam Canine & Feline Vaccines Nail Trim/Ear Cleaning Anal Gland Expression Spay and neuter surgery and Preventatives (additional cost) We also go beyond just numbers to tell the whole story. Communities who often mistrusted animal "authorities" now see our MVC as a place to come for help without fear of losing their pet because the pet has not gotten care in the past and thus may be in poor condition. Families who might not have been aware of other programs at HSN or other community services now have access and information from our MVC counselors via Collier Cares and other information we have garnered about available social services. In 2023 HSN created a social worker position attached to the MVC who can reach out still further to assist families whose issues with their pets can sometimes be just the tip of the iceberg of problems needing attention. HSN has long had a strong commitment to community outreach and the MVC in its first two years of operation has exponentially increased our abilty to act on that commitment.

We have several dedicated volunteers and funders who annually provide major donations to support our SNAP and community/feral cat spay/neuter programs. We also raise significant general funds for operations in which are incuded spay/neuter surgeries.

We have identified a number of committed donors, both foundations and individuals, who are supportive of spay/neuter. We will feature special appeals and social media outreach during spay/neuter awareness month (February) and will ensure that at least one of our direct mail mass appeals speaks directly to the need for support for spay/neuter.
