Operation Catnip runs several programs, all based on reducing the community cat population and eliminating suffering due to lack of basic health care services. Our various programs include: the signature Targeted Community Cat spay-neuter clinics; the Kitten Shelter Diversion Program; Caretaker Support; Working Cat Placements; Critical Care Medical fund; Food banks; Deployments to underserved areas in collaboration with other rescue groups; summer Fellowships, Internships and Externships for veterinary students, and volunteer opportunities for veterinary students. Until two years ago, we used the clinical facilities at other organizations to stage our clinics. Now, Operation Catnip has our own, fully equipped building. This allows us to efficiently hold clinics any day of the week, effectively store and distribute traps for caregivers and the public, thus providing consistently reliable services to the entire community of free-roaming cats. Clinics are now held in our new building three or four days a week. Routinely 50 to 90 cats are sterilized during each clinic. In 2022 we altered a total of 7,116 cats, an increase of over 33% from 2021. Last year, 7,961 cats were altered, and we have the capacity to do even more. Our Medical Director is Dr. Elizabeth Fitzgerald, DVM. Liz has extensive experience in shelter medicine and most recently was the lead veterinarian at Alachua County Animal Care & Rescue. She serves our board in an advisory capacity. Dr. Simone Guerios, DVM, MS, PhD is on our board. She is the current holder of the endowed chair for the Grevior Shelter Medicine Community Outreach Professorship at the UF College of Veterinary Medicine.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Operation Catnip has been providing our North Central Florida region with free spay-neuter for community cats since our inception in 1998. Over 87,000 cats have been sterilized through our various programs. Our municipal shelter has reduced feline intakes to an annual, minimal number. Live release rates are now over 90%. We also serve the surrounding, mostly rural areas and they benefit from our lifesaving programs. We maintain a unique partnership with the UF College of Veterinary Medicine, providing enhanced training to students in areas that are lacking in the traditional veterinary curriculum. This collaboration allows students to gain valuable surgical and clinical skills prior to graduation. All vet students are eligible. Students in large animal, wildlife, and even aquatics divisions at the UFCVM participate in our clinics. We know that community cats are prevalent wherever they ultimately serve.

Please explain if you believe your target area animal population is significantly different than above. We do not have any reason to believe that Alachua County might have significantly different statistics than those computed al	pove.		
Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area: Unowned free-roaming cats represent a substantial portion of the total cat population in Alachua County. Programs aimed at reducing cat overpopulation must include provisions for neutering unowned free-roaming cats, and those efforts should target the general public, not just pet owners. This application will support our methods of providing additional assistance to those members of the public who care for the cats but for a variety of reasons are unable to trap and/or transport on their own.			
What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs? Alachua County has a few low-cost spay-neuter facilities or programs. But combined they are lacking in capacity and flexibility to meet the community's needs, especially for community cats. St. Francis Pet Care, Fix Them All and the Humane Society of North Central Florida offer services for both companion pets and community cats. They are all low-cost but the fees for community cat spay-neuters range from \$45 to \$100 per cat. There are no other low-cost options in Alachua and none of them are totally donation based offering free surgeries like Operation Catnip.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

There is insufficient surgical capacity in Alachua County to accommodate the demand for spaying and neutering. This is true not just for the community cats on which our program focuses, but the demand is not being met for companion pets in the region either. This grant will allow us to increase surgical capacity by bringing necessary assistance to those residents who care for the cats in their neighborhoods but lack the financial means and the physical abilities to trap and transport for required surgeries. There are no other life-affirming organizations in this North Central Florida region that offer humane programs exclusively for community cats. Our project will continue and expand the outreach started last year by providing direct spay-neuters necessary to expand capacity within Alachua County's rural regions. The areas most affected will be rural and impoverished areas outside of the City of Gainesville and those pockets of financial hardship exemplified by mobile home parks within populated areas. Without viable free spay-neuter programs, even low-cost services are prohibitive for most people in the area, especially when they are looking to spay-neuter multiple cats.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

In the past year, our Community Cat Coordinator trapped and/or transported 717 cats, a little less than 10% of the total cats treated. The balance of the cats, 7,244 were brought to us by residents who had the ability to do so themselves. This is a small segment of our total reach in the region. The whole program relies on the combination of those who can trap and transport on their own while some are physically challenged and require our assistance. This expansion of the program will add 555 cats during the grant period. It is well within our capabilities to fulfill.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Operation Catnip recognizes that caregivers provide ongoing care for community cats. Consequently, our focus is the welfare of the cats, the caregivers, and the community through the humane control of free-roaming community cats. We do not place barriers to quality medical care and sterilizations as doing so would be counter-productive to our mission, resulting in fewer cats receiving the service required.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We educate the public on cat issues with flyers, door hangers, and several brochures depending on the type of program promoted in the area. All of these are in collaboration with our local municipal shelter. This request highlights the extension of programs that use enhanced caregiver assistance methods to reach more people and the cats in their care. This has resulted in an increased level of cats now coming to our clinics for services.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Operation Catnip directly addresses those barriers as part of our primary mission. In some cases, caregivers are not physically or financially able to trap and transport on their own as they are either elderly or handicapped. Where caregivers need assistance, trapping, transportation and return of the cats to their colonies will be provided by Operation Catnip staff, mostly our Community Cat Coordinator utilizing our own climate-controlled van that has been outfitted for the safe transport of many community cats in one trip.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

Most of the cats that come to our clinics are brought to us by their caregivers. Liability releases are signed by the caregivers upon intake. This planned expansion is part of our existing Community Cat Outreach Program.

Operation Catnip does not charge any fees or collect co-pays for our services. We do, however, request donations at point of service, but it is not a requirement for service. No cat is turned away due to inability by their caregiver to donate. The average donation over the past year has been about \$15 per spay-neuter. The current cost to deliver a spay or a neuter in the past year has risen due to increased costs for the consumables used for surgeries and labor costs. Our total cost per surgery is now \$70, including the rabies vaccination. This also includes \$10 combined for the FVRCP vaccination and an application of parasite control. Stripping out the FVRCP and Revolution which is not included in this request, we are proposing a cost to the grant of \$45 per surgery, net of average donations.

Alachua County Animal Resources & Care	AR&C shelter staff will help identify and refer cats for TNR services and work with our Community Cat Coordinator on community issues and education. Operation Catnip is a proud partner with AR&C and collaborates on all cat related issues. In addition, Operation Catnip takes unadoptable adult cats that cannot be returned to the field and places them in our Working Cats Adoption Program.

The second part of our dual mission involves the active participation of veterinary student volunteers to perform many of the functions within each clinic. We have included a copy of our Annual Report of Activities for 2023 as part of this application. It notes several metrics but one that is relevant here is the number of spay-neuters that are performed by our students. Last year, 123 different students performed 5,321 of those surgeries. Our DVM Coaches oversee each surgery to ensure the High-Quality of the procedures. Students are not charged for this learning environment. You will also see the chart that details the rapid and sustainable decrease in feline intakes and rates of euthanasia at the local ACAR&C shelter. Even though Alachua County is clearly a no-kill sanctuary for cats, we need to maintain this high level of spaying and neutering if we are to continue to see these results going forward. We cannot afford to backslide in this pursuit.

Examinations, FVRCP vaccinations, and parasite control are administered as appropriate to every cat coming through our clinic. The average cost per cat of \$10 for these items is part of Operation Catnip's internal budgeting and are not included in the grant cost proposed.

Describe any other funding sources for this program, i.e. other grants, targeted fundraising efforts, budget allocation, etc.

We do not have any other funding requests pending for the Rural and Low-Income TNR Outreach currently. We have received a few grants this year for our other programs, and some grant requests are pending or scheduled. The total clinic budget for 2024 is \$510,000. Of that, this Rural and Low-Income TNR Outreach is \$89,000, not including non-clinic staffing or vehicle expenses. We are contemplating using this program as our basis for the upcoming grant to Petco Love Foundation during their April cycle, but that is still TBD. If not, then we will apportion General Operating funds to the balance of this program.

Future Funding to Sustain Public Spay/Neuter

Spay-neuter for community cats is the cornerstone of our mission. To successfully maintain the mission, Operation Catnip has prospered and grown through our 26-year history, primarily through our local fundraising efforts. Local donations comprise most of the revenues to our organization, even as we have grown the mission and its needs. We believe that a thorough and robust fundraising plan combined with an organizational culture of philanthropy will sustain, expand, and scale our programs to effectively serve the community for the long-term. As an example of our local base, and a sign of the support we generate from those who know us best, Operation Catnip's participation in our Community Foundation of North Central Florida's annual Amazing Give Social Media fundraising event earned us over \$70,000 last year. The community in total raised over \$1,200,000 for local non-profit organizations during this 12-hour giving event held at the end of April. Operation Catnip had the second highest total number of donors during the event and the third most total donations. This accomplishment was out of 126 organizations participating, including many that are much larger. This is a continuing trend that our small, but scrappy organization has maintained during this annual event. We have always placed in the top five in both categories every year. These continuing results attest to Operation Catnip's local presence, acceptance, and ability to harvest financial support from our community.

Our programs offer multiple opportunities for display and signage. If provided with posters, we will place them in a stand-up frame at the check-in area where people congregate to admit their cats for clinics, for borrowing traps, and during discharge. We have hundreds of traps that are made available to anyone needing to trap cats for our clinics. Florida Animal Friends receives mentions in our social media postings. Our Facebook pages alone have over 17,000 followers who are treated every day to a new and informative post on upcoming events or helpful topics on the proper care for their neighborhood cats.
