SOCKS has previously received a small amount of funds from Okaloosa County in order to help local residents with a low-cost spay/neuter program. We are constantly receiving calls requesting assistance for low-cost spay neuter services, so we work regularly with local transport services to have these surgeries performed accordingly.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

SOCKS did a low-cost spay/neuter program for \$25 for residents of Okaloosa County who are on financial assistance to spay/neuter. Additionally, SOCKS has an ongoing campaign to support funding low-cost spay neuter for residents in need of assistance. SOCKS also partners with a local restaurant to receive a percent of product sales that are then donated to helping local residents cover low-cost spay neuter services.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat overpopulation in the target area: SOCKS believes the most substantial source of cat overpopulation is residents not spaying/neutering their pets. Many people do not realize how frequently cats breed litt kittens, and the counties do not have enough resources to address the root of the problem.		
What kinds of spay/neuter services are currently available in the target area and in what ways are these resources currently insufficient to meet community needs?		
Currently, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, and Walton counties all share one low-cost clinic in Baker, Florida. The capacity for this low-cost clinic far exceeds the demand for its services, and even SOCKS struggles to get one or two appointments every once in a while. Additionally, since the clinic is located in Baker, which many residents are too far away from and cannot access its services. SOCKS also recognizes the issues with the local vets having little to no appointment availability, so the spay/neuter transport becomes necessary when when are conducting TNR for our community. Since we are in a more rural area, there are more animals and less people to care for them. The general lack of awareness, cost, and lack of spay/neuter services often deter many individuals from having their felines fixed, which then creates more issues with cat overpopulation in our community.		
Florida Animal Friend is highly supportive of proposals that are focused on animal populations that are identified as substantial sources of dog or cat overpopulation rather than being diluted over too broad of a geographic area or diverse animal populations. Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

SOCKS will utilize funds awarded to sterilize approximately 250 felines. Additionally, direct results from the Feline Fix project include sterilizations decreasing the total number of feral and domestic cats in the community, improving the quality of life for both residents and felines, educating the public on the importance of feline sterilization, and the ability to offer more affordable options for low-cost spay/neuter services to the public.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

The Feline Fix project directly impacts the approximated 250 felines that will be spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and micro-chipped. By sterilizing 250 cats, we are reducing cat overpopulation by a substantial amount. For example, the average female cat can have up to 280 kittens in her lifetime. By sterilizing 250 cats, we could prevent a potential 70,000 kittens from being born in the first place.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Residents that qualify as low-income and are receiving disability or other government assistance (with proof) will have the co-pay fee waived for low-cost sterilization services. Otherwise, residents will pay a \$25 co-pay for the sterilization.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

SOCKS will advertise the Feline Fix program through its social media platforms, including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and TikTok. Additionally, at all community and chamber events that SOCKS attends, we will promote the Feline Fix program as well as provide educational resources on feline sterilization to community residents.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

SOCKS will address barriers to these services by addressing needs on an individual basis. We will go out of our way to ensure that all cats are properly cared for, and SOCKS will work with individuals on any barriers pertaining to transportation, finances, or other miscellaneous issues that residents can face.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe the vehicles, methods for confinement, personnel training, liability releases used to assure the safety of the animals and handlers.

When necessary, SOCKS partners with other groups that already provide transportation to low-cost spay/neuter clinics. These groups provide the driver of the vehicles, and SOCKS delivers the cats in carriers to be transported. We sign a release form to the organization transporting giving them authorization to transport each cat. The animals are placed in a sturdy, hard-sided carriers of appropriate size to accommodate each cat. Each carrier has newspaper lining the bottom to absorb any urine or feces. The newspaper is replaced if soiled during transit. The carriers are strapped into the transport vehicle to avoid shifting during transit. The transport vehicle has air conditioning so that the animals have fresh air at all times. The safety and comfort of the felines is a priority to SOCKS.

Veterinary Services

What arrangements have you made with veterinarians to perform the surgeries?

SOCKS will work with Crossroads Animal Clinic, Northside Veterinary Clinic, Operation Spay Bay, Spay Neuter Imapct Project (SNIPS), and Wiregrass Spay/Neuter Alliance to perform TNR on our community cats. Arrangements include but are not limited to: contacting the vet for appointment availability, scheduling appointments, owner/colony leaders are responsible for feline drop-off/pick-up at designated TNR pick-up site, and the feline is then returned back to its owner. All vets will ear-tip and provide pain medications during surgeries. SOCKS will provide microchips to any resident who requests on for an additional \$11 cost.

SOCKS will cover any remaining costs associated with the Feline Fix program. The vets that SOCKS works with do include ear notching, and SOCKS plans to work with local groups such as the APL to run campaigns and raise adequate funding for the remaining costs of micro-chipping and vaccinating felines. Additionally, SOCKS has several private donors who often contribute to our TNR efforts.

In the past, SOCKS has received and expended all funds awarded from Florida Animal Friends. SOCKS has also received a couple of county grants to support our TNR efforts. Additionally, SOCKS regularly partners with local businesses to donate proceeds toward spay/neuter efforts.
