Give additional background information on your organization's programs as they relate to this application and the qualifications of the personnel who will be in charge of this program. Show that you have the capacity to carry out this program.

We transitioned from being a shelter to a resource center in 2009, and developed programs to prevent the needless relinquishment of pets to shelters. Our primary programs include a low-cost wellness clinic and high-volume spay neuter clinic. We also maintain a Pet Food Pantry and collaborate with various dog trainers for behavioral consults. Dr. Lauren Rockey is our primary veterinarian, who routinely performs 40 spay neuters in a day, and we employ Dr. Michele Nelligan and Dr. Kevin Eastman on a regular part-time schedule. Carolyn Smith, executive director since 2011, oversees the financial operations. Jeannie McLain, operations manager since 2012, manages the staff schedules, protocols and procedures. We have 6 vet techs and several volunteer recovery techs and instrument techs. In 2020 we renovated and added surgery space which includes four heated sx tables and five anesthesia machines, three M-11 autoclaves, and enough high quality spay neuter instruments to maintain 125 sx packs.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Our staff was trained by ASPCA Spay Neuter Alliance in Asheville, NC in 2015. We implemented the training to establish a spay neuter program and have continued to grow the program over the last 8 years. In 2023, we performed 2869 sterilizations. We operate the spay neuter clinic 2 days a week and the wellness clinic 3 days a week. When FAF funds are unavailable, we always offer low-cost services and maintain a Cookie Jar Medical Fund to provide free services to pet owners in need. In 2023, we allocated \$24,000 from the general operating budget to the Cookie Jar Fund along with an anticipated \$6000 in direct donations to the Cookie Jar to subsidize our low-cost clinic. We also have a collaboration with Street Dog Coalition to serve pets of the homeless.

Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

The \$25,000 funding from Florida Animal Friend will be instrumental in enabling us to perform 494 sterilizations, comprising 394 cats and 100 dogs. Our primary objective is to address the pressing issue of pet overpopulation in St. Johns County, which is exacerbated by its status as one of the highest growth areas in Florida. While it's challenging to precisely quantify the direct impact on shelter admissions, we recognize the urgent need for affordable spay/neuter services in our community. The demand for our low-cost services continues to rise steadily. By leveraging this funding, we aim to meet this escalating demand effectively. Our historical data underscores the effectiveness of our efforts. Over the past years, we have witnessed a consistent increase in the number of surgeries performed annually. In 2020, we conducted 2,169 surgeries, which rose to 2,417 in 2021,

and further increased to 2,610 in 2022. By 2023, our commitment led to 2,869 surgeries. Looking ahead, we anticipate a continued annual increase of approximately 10% in sterilization numbers for the years 2024 and 2025. However, the critical distinction lies in the impact of FAF funding. With the support of Florida Animal Friend, this increase will be strategically focused on low-income populations that significantly contribute to the overpopulation issue.

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

We are unable to offer free surgeries without supporting funds. The last award received from Florida Animal Friend was utilized from September 2022 to July 2023. We were able to complete sterilizations of 83 dogs and 72 cats from low-income households, and 357 community cats. Total spay neuters: 512. We spent an additional \$642.50 from internal funds to reach this program goal. The FAF grant adds surgery numbers from the most vulnerable populations, as these animals would otherwise not receive services due to financial constraints. During months when grant funds are not available, we are able to offer our regular low-cost fees, but unfortunately, the lowest income population producing the most unwanted pets is not able to pay even our lowest fees. We subsidize with internal funds when we are able.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

We conduct interviews with our clients to assess their needs, and upon agreement, they sign a declaration confirming their requirement. We adopt a compassionate approach and do not mandate proof of income or government assistance. Our aim is to provide support, particularly during these challenging economic times. We acknowledge that even those who were previously self-sufficient may now encounter difficulties in providing for their families and pets.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

Many locals are already aware of the license plate grant funding, and word of mouth seems to be the best marketing. We promote the program on our roadside electronic message board, on Facebook, and E-newsletters. Our Community Relations Director, Lynn Washington, is always in the field and personally talking to citizens in the target areas, especially high-density community cat neighborhoods. He also has a regular television spot on First Coast Living (First coast News) and on River City Live (Action News) We post flyers at appropriate locations.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Two of our vet techs speak Spanish, which is helpful at times. The FAF form is simple, but we are aware of difficulties that some clients might experience. Our volunteers and staff are able to assist pet owners individually with the required paperwork, often filling out the information through conversation. Council on Aging has provided transportation for our elderly clients with their pets as needed.

If necessary, please explain the procedures and fees described above:

A brief exam is performed on animals prior to anesthesia. Feral cats are examined after anesthesia. We provide a rabies vaccination at no charge if needed. Our other vaccinations and tests are optional and provided at a low-cost rate. Every animal receives pain medication, including every community cat which receives a long-lasting injectable. Topical flea prevention is applied at no charge to cats that appear to have a flea infestation. We offer optional various parasite preventatives at additional cost. Community

cats/feral cats will receive surgery, a rabies & a distemper vaccination, ear-tipping, along with no charge ear mite treatment and flea preventative. We maintain a trap depot for cat caregivers to borrow, as community cats must arrive in humane traps. We supply the spay neuter services, but we do not manage colonies or get involved with the actual "trapping and returning" as a comprehensive TNR program level.

Our mission is to establish a supportive ecosystem for disadvantaged pet owners, ensuring they have access to essential spay neuter surgeries and veterinary care. Unlike other programs constrained by strict financial eligibility criteria, we welcome all pet owners, recognizing the importance of inclusivity in addressing community needs. Leveraging various financial assistance avenues such as our Cookie Jar Fund and Scratchpay financing options, we strive to bridge the affordability gap for those in need. FAF funds will target those pet owners most in need. Operating five days a week, our facility offers personalized in-person assistance alongside convenient online pre-registration and email support, ensuring accessibility for all. A recent expansion has significantly enhanced our capacity to accommodate more appointments, thereby expanding our reach within the community. With rising concerns about inflation, we anticipate an increased demand for our safety net services. The support from the Florida Animal Friend grant will enable us to extend our outreach to a specific segment of our community. Despite facing escalating operational costs, we remain committed to keeping our fees low, recognizing the financial difficulties faced by our target demographic. To incentivize responsible pet ownership, our low-cost veterinary clinic exclusively serves pet owners who consent to their pets undergoing sterilization, thus promoting the importance of spay/neuter services. Moreover, our commitment to community welfare extends to the humane management of community cat populations through our provision of a trap depot for caregivers. At the culmination of the grant period, we pledge to furnish a comprehensive report, inclusive of statistical data pertaining to animal species and gender, as well as any additional specifics stipulated by the Florida Animal Friend grant requirements. This report will serve as a testament to our dedication to transparency and accountability in our endeavors to serve the community's needs effective

The \$10 paid by client helps to ensure they keep their appointment and helps to mitigate the cost of rabies vaccination and parasite control. Community cat packages are all inclusive and described on the FAF form as well as our regular surgery form. Optional vaccines, diagnostics, advanced parasite preventatives, and e-collars are the responsibility of the pet owner. However, no animal will leave without necessary treatment, and additional costs will be absorbed. Many expenses associated with the program will be allocated from our general operating budget, and our "Spay it Forward" donations.

Describe any other funding sources for this program, i.e. other grants, targeted fundraising efforts, budget allocation, etc.

We allocate a substantial amount in our budget to the Cookie Jar Medical Fund to subsidize veterinary costs on a case by case basis. We have a collaboration with Street Dog Coalition to provide vaccines and preventatives for pets of the homeless. Upon request, Street Dog will subsidize spay neuter as needed. Our vendors provide us with free and discounted goods to supplement as needed. All other overhead costs are absorbed in our general operating budget. Our biggest fundraising effort of the year, the Pin Up Paws Campaign brings in approximately \$80,000 to be used in general operations, which assists in keeping our low-cost model sustainable

Our low-cost, high-volume spay neuter program is based on the ASPCA Spay Neuter Alliance model, which is designed to be sustainable. We are the only clinic in St. Johns County with this designation and as part of the network we receive additional discounts from Merck and from MWI. We actively seek donations through various fundraising efforts. The annual fundraising schedule is attached for your review ("other"). We also maintain a pet spa on the property as a revenue generating program to help fund our charity services.
