Cat Depot is a highly regarded feline resource center with a proven track record of providing comprehensive care for cats and supporting our community through veterinary services, education, and outreach programs. Our Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) program is an essential component of our Community Cats Program, designed to humanely manage and stabilize the free-roaming cat population while improving their overall health and reducing the spread of disease. Our TNVR program is led by Dr. Michelle Cunningham, DVM, who has over 20 years of veterinary experience. As Cat Depot's lead veterinarian, she oversees all TNVR medical procedures, including spay/neuter surgeries, vaccinations, and microchipping, ensuring the highest standard of care for every cat treated through the program. In addition, Jenn Kennedy, Shelter & Intake Manager, coordinates the TNVR program. With over 10 years of shelter management experience, she is also a Certified Veterinary Technician and TNVR-certified by Dr. Rachel Geller. Jenn conducts on-site assessments of cat colonies, monitors colony populations, and ensures that colony caretakers—many of whom are clients of our Pet Food Bank—are in compliance with TNVR protocols. This proactive approach ensures that all cats within these colonies are sterilized, preventing further overpopulation. In 2024 alone, Cat Depot increased TNVR treatments by over 350% from 2023, performing over 400 TNVR procedures. This growth highlights both the demand for TNVR services in our community and

our organization's ability to scale operations effectively. Florida's warm climate allows for continuous year-round reproduction among outdoor cats, making TNVR an especially critical intervention to prevent exponential population growth. Beyond TNVR, Cat Depot operates a state-of-the-art facility with a Shelter Hospital for injured and ill stray cats and a Community Clinic that provides subsidized veterinary care. Additionally, we engage in community education and outreach, offering programs such as summer camps, yoga with cats, and nursing home visits—demonstrating our commitment to both feline welfare and public engagement. With experienced leadership, a proven track record of successful TNVR operations, and the capacity to expand our lifesaving efforts, Cat Depot is well-positioned to carry out this program and maximize its impact on our community.

# Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

Cat Depot currently operates a no-cost TNVR program designed to provide low-cost and no-cost spay/neuter services for community cats. Our program is designed to address the overpopulation of free-roaming and feral cats, and we offer these services free of charge for qualifying individuals and organizations. We have a robust infrastructure to support this work, including three transport vans to assist with the safe and efficient transport of cats from various locations. We collaborate closely with individual trappers, local organizations like Feline Friends, and Sarasota County Animal Control to ensure that cats from across Sarasota, Manatee and Desoto Countys are able to access our services. Additionally, we assist local cat colony caretakers and community members by lending traps or sending a trapper to help with the trapping process. This ensures that cats are safely and humanely trapped before being brought to our Shelter Hospital for spay/neuter, vaccination, and ear tipping—all at no cost to the individual or organization. Through this program, we are able to provide a critical service to both community cats and the people who care for them, furthering our mission to reduce the outdoor cat population in a humane and sustainable way.

## Objectives

## What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

With the requested \$25,000 in funding, Cat Depot aims to expand its TNVR efforts by increasing the number of sterilized community cats by nearly 200% of last year's total. Our focus will be twofold: continuing to support individual trappers in DeSoto County, where TNVR resources are extremely limited, and addressing the growing need for TNVR in our local Sarasota-Manatee area due to the recent closure of the Humane Society's veterinary clinic. By targeting these underserved regions, we aim to prevent the birth of thousands of homeless kittens while improving the health and stability of existing outdoor cat populations.

#### How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

In 2024, Cat Depot's TNVR program grew significantly, with treatments increasing by over 350% from 2023. At the end of the year, we completed 408 TNVR procedures, marking a substantial milestone in this revitalized program's growth and success. For 2025, we have committed to increasing our capacity by onboarding volunteer veterinarians and increasing our existing baseline of days in which TNVR is performed. In 2025, we will host biweekly TNVR days instead of monthly. Additionally, with the recent closure of the Humane Society's veterinary clinic, the demand for TNVR services in our area has grown significantly. These funds will help us step in to fill that gap, ensuring that more community cats receive the care they need and preventing thousands of future kittens from being born into homelessness.

#### Methods

#### What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Eligibility for Cat Depot's TNVR program is determined based on several key criteria to ensure effective population management. Any community cat that does not have an ear tip is eligible for TNVR services, allowing us to focus on unaltered cats in need of sterilization. Additionally, any cat brought in by our dedicated volunteer trappers or local animal services qualifies for the program, ensuring that we address the most at-risk populations. We also work closely with caretakers who receive support from our Pet Food Bank. Our Shelter Manager monitors these local cat colonies to ensure responsible population control. To remain eligible for food assistance, caretakers must have all cats in their colony spayed or neutered and prevent new litters from being born. This approach helps maintain stable, healthy cat populations while reinforcing the importance of TNVR in our community.

### How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

Cat Depot promotes its TNVR program through a multifaceted marketing approach to effectively reach our target audience. Our inhouse marketing efforts include leveraging multiple social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, X, YouTube, and TikTok to engage the community and raise awareness. Additionally, we distribute press releases to local media, conduct email outreach through e-blasts, and utilize our LED marquee outside the shelter to share important updates. Beyond digital and traditional advertising, much of our TNVR outreach comes from our strong presence in the local community. We collaborate with volunteer trappers, cat colony caretakers, local animal services, and other animal welfare organizations to spread awareness and connect with those who need TNVR resources the most. Currently, we are also actively promoting a need for additional TNVR veterinary technician volunteers to expand our impact.

#### How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

Cat Depot works to eliminate barriers to accessing our TNVR program by providing hands-on support to community members. We collaborate with a network of dedicated volunteer trappers, some of whom are bilingual, to assist those who may face language or communication challenges. For individuals who cannot transport cats themselves, we have three Cat Depot cargo vans available when needed. Additionally, we offer trap rentals and conduct site visits to assess colony populations, ensuring targeted and efficient TNVR efforts. For those unable to trap cats on their own, our experienced trappers can be dispatched to assist, making the program more accessible to those with physical limitations or limited resources. Through these efforts, we strive to make TNVR as inclusive and effective as possible.

#### Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe.

Yes, this project sometimes involves the transportation of animals by Cat Depot staff as needed. We have three transport vans that are used to assist with the safe relocation of cats for TNVR services. Our Shelter & Intake Manager occasionally transports cats from as far as DeSoto County, ensuring that even communities with limited access to veterinary resources can benefit from our program. As our TNVR program continues to grow, we are open to expanding our transportation efforts to better serve the needs of trappers, colony caretakers, and community members who may face challenges in bringing cats to our facility.

## If necessary, please explain the procedures and fees described above:

Each cat undergoing a TNVR procedure at Cat Depot receives an FVRCP and rabies vaccine at no cost. As part of our comprehensive approach to feline health, we also offer additional medical services at affordable rates: Praziquantel Tapeworm Injection – \$10.34 Selamectin (Heartworm treatment) – \$8.50 FeLV Vaccine – \$20 To ensure that sterilized cats are easily identifiable, each TNVR cat receives a tattoo during surgery. Since Cat Depot operates a full-service Shelter Hospital, we also provide additional medical care, such as wound treatment, on a case-by-case basis. This allows us to address urgent health concerns while maintaining our focus on TNVR as a humane and effective solution for managing community cat populations.

Cat Depot's TNVR program operates with a structured tracking and reporting system to ensure efficiency and impact. Each cat is logged in a spreadsheet and included in weekly staff reports, allowing us to monitor progress, assess resource allocation, and adjust outreach efforts as needed. Our Shelter & Intake Manager conducts site visits to colonies, ensuring compliance with TNVR protocols and preventing unmanaged population growth. We are currently bolstering our outreach efforts for TNVR. Cat Depot will have an informational table at the county fair and is actively forming partnerships with local Farmer's Markets to table regularly as well. By combining meticulous tracking, direct community engagement, and accessible medical care, Cat Depot's TNVR program effectively stabilizes free-roaming cat populations while improving feline health and strengthening community partnerships.

Cat Depot is deeply committed to revitalizing and expanding our TNVR program to better serve community cats and their caretakers. We actively seek private donations, grants, and fundraising opportunities to sustain and grow this critical program. We are increasing our community outreach efforts by tabling at events and engaging with local residents to spread awareness about TNVR services. To secure long-term sustainability, we are participating in the Rescue Roundtable with Best Friends Network, which will help us qualify for more substantial TNVR funding in the future. By combining grant funding, private donations, and expanded outreach, we are working to re-establish and strengthen our TNVR program to ensure continued success in managing free-roaming cat populations.

## Promotion of Florida Animal Friend Spay/Neuter License Plate

Cat Depot will promote the Florida Animal Friend Spay/Neuter License Plate through multiple channels, ensuring broad community awareness and engagement. We will issue press releases, prominently feature the program on our website and social media, and include information in our print and electronic newsletters. To further encourage participation, adopters who show proof of a Florida Animal Friend License Plate will receive a \$10 discount on adoption fees per cat. Beyond our internal promotions, Cat Depot regularly contributes to Suncoast Pet, providing an additional platform to highlight the importance of the FL Animal Friend program. We recently received a feature spread in Bradenton Magazine, expanding our outreach to a wider audience. Additionally, we anticipate significant publicity from our recent SRQ Magazine awards, further amplifying awareness of our mission and the importance of spay/neuter initiatives.
