The mission of First Coast No More Homeless Pets (FCNMHP) is to make veterinary care affordable and accessible to all as we save lives by keeping dogs and cats in homes and out of shelters, provide low-cost or free spay/neuter services with an emphasis on feral/community cats, and deliver a broad range of related programs and services. Through a number of funding streams including the City of Jacksonville, individual donations, and private foundation support, we operate one of the largest Spay/Neuter clinics in the country with over 21,200 surgeries a year, helping families and 17 animal welfare organizations afford to fix the pets in their care. Our combination of aggressive spay/neuter efforts and pet retention programs has resulted in significant improvement in animal welfare. In 2002, the year we were formed, more than 32,000 animals entered the Jacksonville shelters, and in excess of 23,000 of those animals were killed. In 2023, intake at Jacksonville Animal Care and Protective Services (JACPS) was 5,390 and 587 animals were euthanized. Thanks to our work, Jacksonville became the first city in the nation to declare that no cat would be killed in the shelter simply because it is feral. This has become a model for the nation, and adopted by communities across the country. Notably, with so many shelters at capacity, we know how vital it is for us to continue our partnerships with JACPS, Jacksonville Humane Society (JHS), the 17 rescues, and trappers that we work with. This is why the support of Florida Animal Friend is so important in Northeast Florida! Beyond our Spay/Neuter services, our low-cost clinic and state-of-the-art veterinary hospital—both located in underrepresented Jacksonville neighborhoods—are open to the public seven days a week, providing high quality care at affordable prices. We have a range of payment plans and charitable funds that allow us to provide services to individuals and families with tight budgets and medical care to sick or injured strays when the finder agrees to adopt or rehome the stray. We operate a pet food bank, run by volunteers, with donated food, which serves as another method of keeping families and their pets together. To date, we have distributed more than two million pounds of pet food to low-income pet owners. Our Spay/Neuter and medical programs are overseen by Dr. Yvonne Kline, Chief Medical Officer. We offer surgeries six days a week and have the capacity to handle the additional surgeries this grant would cover. We track all surgeries and statistics and will be able to document our

success. We have an active Public Relations Department to advertise the program by way of media releases, newsletters, flyers, social media, and PSA's.

Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

As noted, through a number of funding streams including the City of Jacksonville, individual donations, and private foundation support, we operate one of the largest spay/neuter clinics in the country helping all families afford to fix their pets. Last year we performed 21,212 spay/neuter surgeries at a cost of over \$1,760,000. Of these, 8,710 were paid for, either by individuals or rescue groups. Grants, either to FCNMHP, or to shelters in other counties, covered an additional 12,502 surgeries. Last year we sterilized 11,597 community cats, performing this critical surgery on as many as 1,738 cats in one month. One of our donors started Rosie's Fund, a matching fund for feral cat surgeries. Last year Rosie's Fund brought in \$110,809.39, enough for 2,014 community cat surgeries. The remaining surgeries, were paid by our funds, the majority of which were for subsidized feral surgeries, or Feral Freedom (surgeries for cats brought to us by the Jacksonville Animal Care and Protective Services). The primary focus for our surgeries is community cats. As mentioned, last year we sterilized 11,597 community cats. Our goal is to match (or exceed) this number this year. If we are to stabilize and control the feral cat population in Duval County, it is critical that we sterilize as many cats as possible. This year we will receive \$232,402.00 from the City of Jacksonville that will cover 3,873 cat surgeries. We expect this grant to last 6 1/2 months. Based on past experience, 75% of the cats brought in under this program will be community cats, amounting to 2,904 community cat surgeries. The additional 454 surgeries from Florida Animal Friend, when added to city funding, will help reach a total of 3,359 surgeries. We will again heavily promote Rosie's Fund, and anticipate receiving a similar amount this year, covering 2,014 surgeries. We will also seek additional funding to attain our goal of equaling or surpassing last year's number of community cat surgeries (11.597). These funds are needed because the community impact is directly related to funding. We know that if we can offer free surgeries through the year, our surgery numbers will increase because our many volunteer trappers will be encouraged to trap more cats, thereby alleviating the extreme pressure on shelters when kitten season is in full swing.

Please explain what you believe are the most substantial sources of dog and cat over The overpopulation of pets in Duval County is primarily caused by the scarcity of affordable spot awareness regarding responsible pet ownership. Economic difficulties and inadequate enforturther exacerbate the issue. Consequently, our shelters become overcrowded, and many anim streets. Objectives

What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

Our immediate goal is to TNR 454 community cats, at \$55.00 each with a concentration on specific areas of Duval County in order to assist in lowering the number of community cat intakes at Jacksonville Animal Care and Protective Services, the Jacksonville Humane Society, and other shelters/rescues within the targeted areas (and surrounding areas as needed).

How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

A grant of \$25,000 will allow FCNMHP to provide spay/neuter surgeries for 454 community cats. We know that if we can offer free surgeries, our surgery numbers will increase. Holistically, we will use this grant, plus additional grant and donor funding, to meet our goal of exceeding the number of community cat surgeries we performed last year (which was 11,597). It is very important to note that it is highly projected that we will accomplish more surgeries with the support of this grant funding, as we were not recipients in 2024. We are extremely grateful for this opportunity to apply.

Methods

What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

1. Cats must be trapped in Duval County 2. Identification must denote Duval County residency.

How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

JACPS animal care officers will have information about the program on hand to share with members of the community that are within targeted areas, interested in TNR, and/or addressing cat colonies in their communities. We will promote the targeted program on Facebook and across our other social media platforms where we have 33,000+ followers. We will also post information on our website and in email blasts. Importantly, we have the capabilities of targeting individuals on social media as well as those who have visited our website that live within specified areas through geofencing, and will also take advantage of this to ensure that we are reaching the grant-directed areas.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles?

To address barriers to the full utilization of the program, such as English as a second language, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles, we propose implementing a multifaceted approach. Allocating operating funds for social media and marketing campaigns will be crucial in raising awareness about the importance of spaying/neutering pets, targeting various demographics within the community. (These funds will be provided by FCNMHP through other income sources.) Additionally, we will leverage translation software and offer printed promotional materials and forms in different languages to overcome communication barriers and provide information about the program in multiple languages, catering to the diverse cultural backgrounds of our target areas and community. By implementing these strategies, we aim to make the program more accessible and inclusive, ultimately reducing barriers to participation and promoting responsible pet ownership across all segments of the community.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe.

No. However, if needed, FCNMHP has a part-time transporter on staff that has been trained in all aspects of humanely handling community cats. Our transporter uses the company van that is fabricated for transporting animals, and liability insurance is on file as it relates to the position and use of the vehicle.

Volunteer Community Cat Colony Data Collector	HIGH LEVEL OF INVOLVEMENT - As mentioned previously in this application, FCNMHP currently has a volunteer that has pledged over 120 hours of service to the position of Feral Cat Colony Data Collector. Developing a targeted approach to feral cat programs has become increasingly important and we have found ways to involve the community to help identify colonies in areas of greatest need for population control and colony management. Our volunteer will help conduct research and communicate via phone and or/email with volunteer trappers that have utilized FCNMHP feral cat programs to survey for specific colony location, size, and unmet needs. They are charged with organizing this data and compiling reports. It is the goal of this data collection to gain a deeper understanding of what motivates caretakers to respond to colony needs as well as knowledge of the different feral cat services the Jacksonville community has to offer. In turn, we at FCNMHP will be able to nimbly adjust to the community's needs as it relates to community cat colonies and care.
Volunteer Trappers	HIGH LEVEL INVOLVEMENT - Through years of service and community outreach, FCNMHP has developed quite a cadre of community "trappers" that are ready, willing, and able to assist in this TNR effort. These incredible volunteers understand the importance of funding for the care and sterilization of community cats and will be eager to have an opportunity to assist in the project's success.

Jacksonville is fortunate to have so many community members willing to care for colonies of community cats by feeding them and making sure they have been sterilized. However, for many, the cost of surgery for a colony is prohibitive, so if we are going to be successful in dealing with the feral cat population and reduce shelter admission, it is essential that we be able to offer as many free surgeries as possible for this population. We are grateful for the support and work of Florida Animal Friend in reducing shelter admissions through its grant programs and appreciate this opportunity to submit this application to partner again.

As one of the largest Spay/Neuter clinics in the nation, FCNMHP fundraises for Spay/Neuter funds throughout the year as this is at the heart of what we do. Yearly, our grant calendar includes a number of planned grant requests and our fundraising calendar also includes a number of solicitations throughout the year. We work with Duval County and receive funding from the City of Jacksonville to provide services – for community cats and shared areas of great need. Each year, we strategically budget for Spay/Neuter services with a sharp lens on the current issues affecting our community and, as a seasoned provider, have historically, successfully, received funding to cover much of our costs. Notably, it is through the generosity and support of organizations like Florida Animal Friend that allows us to continue the lifesaving work that we do and are grateful for it!
