The Humane Society of Manatee County has been a leader in animal welfare since the launch of its Humane Alliance model Spay/Neuter Clinic in April 2009. As the only high-volume, low-cost spay/neuter clinic in Manatee County, our Veterinary Clinic plays a crucial role in reducing pet overpopulation and improving animal health. Annually, we perform over 5,056 spay/neuter surgeries, including 1,348 feral cat sterilizations, significantly decreasing the number of stray and homeless animals in our community and shelters. Our commitment to accessible veterinary care extends beyond sterilization services. We host free vaccine clinics throughout the year to support financially struggling pet owners, ensuring animals remain healthy and protected from preventable diseases. Additionally, our low-cost Dental Program continues to expand in response to growing community demand, providing essential dental examinations and procedures at affordable rates. Prevention remains at the core of our mission. We actively seek grant funding to offer free and low-cost spay/neuter surgeries for low-income residents, making responsible pet ownership attainable for all. As the leading animal welfare agency in Manatee County, our ability to offer critical programs and services is made possible through our state-of-the-art Veterinary Clinic and the dedication of our Veterinary and Medical Director, Dr. Lindsey Rollend. Grant support will enable us to expand these lifesaving initiatives, reduce animal homelessness, and provide high-quality, affordable veterinary care to those in need.

# Florida Animal Friend grants are for low-cost and/or no-cost spay/neuter programs; If you currently have such a program, please describe

The Humane Society of Manatee County offers a low-cost sterilization program for cats and dogs, including puppies and kittens over two months old and weighing at least two pounds. These services are available to the public and are a crucial part of our mission to reduce pet overpopulation. In addition to providing affordable spay/neuter surgeries for owned pets, we also offer sterilization

services for community and feral cats, which are brought to our Veterinary Clinic in humane traps. Over the years, we have secured multiple grants to support under-served residents and target specific breeds that contribute to overpopulation at the Manatee County Shelter. However, the Manatee County Low-Income Grant provides limited funding, which does not meet the increasing demand for spay/neuter services in our area. This growing need is primarily driven by the rapid population growth in Manatee County. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county's population has increased 14.7% since 2020, leading to a rise in pet ownership. Currently, there are approximately 253,483 owned cats and dogs in Manatee County, and this number is projected to exceed 300,000 within five years. Without adequate funding for spay/neuter services, the risk of pet overpopulation, and shelter overcrowding will continue to grow. In addition to the organic growth of the number of owned pets, the need for low-to-moderate-cost veterinary care also continues to outpace the availability of that care. To address this urgent issue, the Humane Society of Manatee County remains committed to providing low/no-cost veterinary care to those in need. By expanding access to affordable spay/neuter surgeries, we can prevent unwanted litters, reduce the number of homeless animals, and support responsible pet ownership within our community. **Number of animals sterilized in that program in the past year:**

# Objectives

## What do you hope to accomplish with these funds (objectives should be specific and quantifiable)?

The Trap-Neuter-Return program (TNR) is the humane solution to controlling the population of feral / free-roaming cats in Manatee County. This method has been endorsed by national animal welfare groups, as well as many animal services departments, as the best option for feral cats and the communities they inhabit. TNR stabilizes the colony size by eliminating new litters. It also reduces the nuisance behavior associated with unsterilized cats. TNR's most measurable effect is that fewer cats/kittens flow through animal shelters. "During our most recent fiscal year, we successfully performed 1,348 TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) surgeries. However, the demand for this critical program has outpaced our current funding. With additional financial support, we have the capacity to expand our impact and help even more animals in need. A grant from Florida Animal Friends would enable us to perform an additional 367

surgeries, significantly reducing the overpopulation of stray and feral cats in our community while improving their health and well-being."

## How does this program increase the number of sterilization surgeries above the existing baseline?

The demand for spay and neuter services in this community far exceeds the available funding, highlighting the urgent need for additional financial support. Despite this challenge, we are confident in our ability to perform the additional surgeries without difficulty. Our fully equipped veterinary clinic has the capacity to handle a higher volume of procedures, thanks to our dedicated team of trained veterinarians and skilled technicians. With their expertise and commitment, we can efficiently and effectively provide these essential services to reduce the stray and feral cat population. Expanding our spay/neuter efforts will not only prevent the birth of unwanted litters but also improve overall animal welfare, reduce the strain on local shelters, and enhance public health by minimizing the risks associated with unvaccinated and free-roaming animals. By securing additional funding, we can continue offering high-quality, low-cost or free sterilization services, ensuring that every pet owner and community caregiver has access to these vital resources. Our goal is to create a sustainable, long-term solution to pet overpopulation while maintaining our commitment to humane and responsible animal care.

## Methods

#### What criteria will you use to determine eligibility for your program?

Community cats are brought to our Veterinary Clinic in humane traps by rescue groups and community trappers, most of whom we have been collaborating with for years.

#### How will you advertise the program? Explain how the advertising will reach the target audience.

We will advertise this program on our social media sites, radio and local print. Our messaging will be bilingual.

How will you address barriers to full use of the program such as transportation, illiteracy, and cultural hurdles? All of our forms and marketing materials are bilingual. Our staff currently use Google Translate to help overcome language and cultural barriers. Our customer service team is exceptional and trained to assist every client. Additionally, we have a dedicated employee who manages and tracks the TNR program. Lastly, we are actively recruiting bilingual staff.

Does this project involve the transportation of animals by someone other than the client? If so, describe.

Rescue groups and Manatee County Animal Welfare transport TNR cats directly to our Veterinary Clinic.

Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) is a humane and effective method for managing and reducing feral cat populations. By spaying, neutering, and vaccinating cats before returning them to their territories, TNR prevents future litters, improves overall health, and reduces nuisance behaviors like fighting, yowling, and spraying. Unlike ineffective catch-and-kill methods, TNR stabilizes colonies over time, easing the burden on shelters and lowering euthanasia rates. The demand for our TNR services at the Humane Society has grown significantly, highlighting the urgent need for additional resources to meet community needs. TNR is also a cost-effective, long-term solution that fosters community involvement and creates a healthier environment for both animals and residents. By supporting TNR, communities can work toward a sustainable, humane approach to managing stray and feral cat populations.

# Describe any other funding sources for this program, i.e. other grants, targeted fundraising efforts, budget allocation, etc.

Seven months ago, we received funding from the Bishop Parker Foundation to assist with spay/neuter services for financially challenged families and to support our Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) efforts. In addition to this, we established the Spay it Forward fund, encouraging clinic clients and community members to participate. Last fiscal year, this initiative raised over \$14,545, directly benefiting those in need of these critical services. We are now requesting additional funding to cover the increasing demand for services for low-income residents and to further support the expansion of our TNR program. As mentioned previously, we are the only facility in the entire county that provides TNR services, making our role essential in controlling the stray and feral cat population. With the demand for our services growing, we are committed to continuing to seek funding to ensure we can meet the needs of our community and effectively address the overpopulation issues that affect both pets and local shelters.

One of the key initiatives and priorities of our Board of Directors is ensuring that we can meet the growing demand for our spay/neuter program and expand veterinary services in our community. In 2021, our organization partnered with a leading strategy-building company to develop a comprehensive business plan that outlines a clear path for expanding veterinary services at our clinic to better serve local needs. In the past few months, we took further steps to solidify our long-term vision by contracting with a Strategic Planning Consultant. Collaborating with staff and the Board of Directors, we have now developed a comprehensive 5-year strategic plan that covers all of our programs and the organization as a whole. This plan will guide us as we work to scale our operations and enhance our impact on the community. Additionally, our organization creates and executes a detailed Development Plan, which sets out a variety of goals, strategies, and tactics to raise the income necessary to support our programs. This plan ensures that we have the financial resources to sustain and expand our initiatives, allowing us to continue addressing the needs of our community and supporting the long-term success of our mission.
